RABBI'S COLUMN

The Torah of Summer: Doorway to the Days of Awe



It is Jewish tradition to read the Torah annually in weekly portions so that the five books of Moses are read from the beginning of Bereishit to end of Devarim. The annual cycle of readings conclude and begin again at the end of the High Holy Days - on Simchat Torah. This calendar of readings always places Devarim being read during the summer months months when even the temple goes into "summer mode" and activities slow down. For this reason Devarim is arguably the least familiar of the five books as people go on vacation or take a break from the daily temple routine. Content-wise, it is Moses' farewell discourse to

Israel as they prepare to enter the Promised Land. It is an inspired formulation of the story of the Israelites and their relationship to God and God's commandments. Devarim contains the Shema - the fundamental tenet of the Unity of God from which all Jewish belief turns, goes back to it and flows from it. We hear a second recounting of the Ten Commandments and the laws governing and guiding the Israelites toward an existence that pursues justice, equity, the protection of the weak, life and peace. It is in Devarim where we are told repeatedly to chose life over death.

Devarim concludes with the death of a man: Moses. By contrast, The Torah begins with God alone. It then is followed by the story of Creation, the evolution of human behavior and the revelation of the Torah. But it is Devarim that holds the key to the Days of Awe – the most important set of holidays in the Jewish calendar – because it is these Days where we consider how we act towards other humans, weigh our merit and failings, and set our path anew towards a life that's God-inspired. In other words, Devarim provides us a road map to evaluate our behavior towards our fellow human beings, the natural world, and our Gates of Repentance commitment to God who cares for us. As much as our High Holy Day liturgy discuss the



power of God the King, Judge and Father, it is also time to re-frame our behavior towards other humans. In fact, I daresay that the High Holy Days is mostly about human relationships.

We begin with Selichot, which brings up the concept of Transgression and Forgiveness through the special liturgy and musical themes of the High Holy Days. We admit being subject to human weakness, we transgress Torah's precepts not infrequently and, in the process, have offended other human beings Yet like God, we have the capacity to forgive offences committed against us. Selichot begins that process of self realization and self assessment.

Rosh Hashanah celebrates the birth of the world. With three sets of shofar blasts we stand in awe of God who is Omnipotent King, The One Who Remembers Us, and promises the future redemption of the world. We come to understand we are partners with God in Tikkun Olam – shaping the world according to Torah's life affirming precepts.

On Yom Kippur we seek changes from the unhealthy paths in life we have followed; we seek the courage to ask forgiveness from those we have offended, and the ability to forgive those who have offended us. We strive to come closer to a life that includes awareness of God in daily living. If we take the words of our High Holy Day liturgy to heart, we can come away with a sense of renewal and starting afresh, with a lighter soul and a brighter future.

We begin contemplating sin at Selichot, and we conclude Yom Kippur with forgiveness. The Days of Awe is a personal journey that has transformed many a Jew in positive ways over the centuries, bringing the promise of a new and better day. May your journey be fulfilling.

Rosh Chodesh AV: Women of the Wall Blocked by Ultra-Orthodox Protestors:

For the first time in its 25 year history, the Women of the Wall were prevented from entering the women's section at the Kotel The women's section was (Western Wall). filled with thousands of Haredi voung women who had been bused in by the Ultra-Orthodox political party United **Torah** Judaism. Jerusalem police cordoned off a section for the Women of the Wall's Rosh Chodesh Av prayer service at the rear of the outer section, far from the Wall itself. The women, who were not deterred, were surrounded by Haredi men, who shouted insults at the women and threw eggs and water bottles at them.

ARZA Chooses Joshua Weinberg as New President:

Joshua Weinberg has been unanimously approved by the Board of ARZA to serve as the next President of the organization.

Israel to Fund Non-Orthodox Rabbis:

Israel says it will move ahead with the funding of non-Orthodox rabbis. It it happens, this will be a landmark achievement for Reform and Conservative leaders who have long chafed at their second-class treatment by the Israeli government.
