## CANTOR'S COLUMN

### *Our Seasonal Challenge*



We are now in the middle of what we sometimes call “the dog days of summer” – the hottest, muggiest, airless August days. Our schedules are usually somewhat looser; even our clothes are looser. And even if we don’t go away on vacation, daily life seems a lot more carefree. And yet without dropping a beat, we go immediately into the crispness of September, with schedules and responsibilities that were nicely in the rearview mirror just the day before.

Judaism’s teachings have always reflected an awareness of the significance of time and change. *L’chol z’mán v’eit l’chol cheifetz, tachat hashamayim: as Ecclesiastes teaches us, To everything there is a season, and a time for every purpose under the heaven.* The first word of the Torah indicates the awareness of the significance of time and change: *In the beginning...*

While it seems that the mood of the dog days of summer and the contrasting fullness and seriousness of the beginning of fall are opposites, the fact is that they have something very much in common. Jewish liturgy and Jewish philosophy rely on self-reflection as an inherent part of being responsible for one’s spiritual life. So regardless of our relative state of relaxation, that reflection begins even unconsciously during the period that leads up to the beginning of our new year, when reflection begins to take center stage with the observances of Selichot, Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. The lesson for us is that what feels like opposites is actually a continuum that is in harmony with our annual spiritual journey. Both Judaism and our secular world teach us that it is always a time of transition, whether we realize it or not.

## RABBI'S COLUMN

Dear Friends,

Welcome to August, and such an exciting time for us as a community, and me personally as a community leader, spiritual individual and as a Jew.



We are at the starting gate to what I hope will be a wonderful journey. This is a journey to define Temple Isaiah's future as a holy, engaged and committed *Kehillah – Community*. There is so much potential for us, and I look forward to working with all our committees and our wonderful Co-Presidents, Kathie and Bill, to chart a clear vision and business plan to build our temple's membership, grow our educational programming, engage in spiritual endeavors, and of course, continue in our ongoing quest for social justice that has been the moral standard for Temple Isaiah.

There have been many other events that were associated with this date as well, and based on what we know from the Talmud, this is a public day of profound mourning, fasting and yearning for the rebuilding of Jerusalem, and in a very (very) traditional view, the rebuilding of the Temple in Jerusalem.

I see Tisha B'Av a bit differently. Yes, it is a day of mourning and sadness, in fact, the saddest day of the Jewish calendar, but it is also the beginning of the period of time just before the *Yamim Noraim* – the Days of Awe, better known as the High Holy Days. Tisha B'Av can be seen as the portal to a time of mindfulness and personal growth. A time to re-boot. A time to find one's spiritual center.

I feel that I have found my spiritual center at Temple Isaiah. The temple is a synagogue that wants to grow as a community of learners, and this brings great joy to my heart. I have always been someone who searches for higher meaning, and I feel that Temple Isaiah is that sacred space for me. As a Jew, I find that a community that permits spiritual growth allows me to grow in my beliefs, as they change with my understanding of our holy texts and how we interpret them.

May our new journey together be fruitful and enlightening, and may these days leading us into the High Holy Days be a time of spiritual and emotional awakening for us all.

*In October 2016, the Isaiah family gathered together in prayer and fellowship for our 50th High Holiday Season and the start of our Jubilee Year. It is a time to reflect on our past and look forward to the future.*

Irma Leboff, dear friend and former president, could often be heard saying, "If you belong to Temple Isaiah, you must really want to belong to Temple Isaiah."



John and I chose Temple Isaiah over forty years ago, and, as I reflect, our choice has served as the core of much of the Lessers' lives.

As a young family, we were looking for a congregation which had certain qualities: a welcoming spirit, unpretentiousness, a service which we felt comfortable in, and a school that was small and inviting for our children. We also believed in the concept of fair share. (At the time we joined, other local congregations refused anyone who was unable to pay into a building fund and/or those who could not afford the full cost of membership.)

We were not disappointed in the school. The teachers conducted themselves in an attractive way and there were many activities in which the whole family participated such as a Purim carnival, baking latkes on Hanukkah, visits to the bimah by specific classes, and, of course, Shabbat dinners.

Nor were we disappointed in the congregational activities. We began to meet with many other families and participated in social events, discussion groups, and classes. We joined others in the redecoration of the Community Church which was our original home. We helped to paint the religious school classrooms, redecorated the Shalom Room, staffed fundraisers, and provided refreshments for holidays and onegs. We welcomed the congregation to our home during the summer for Friday night services.

Much has changed, as it must. We have had different spiritual leaders, both rabbis and cantors. We have a new home that is our own. We are a part of a changing community.

But the best part has stayed the same—the qualities of the people that are attracted to Temple Isaiah. Its members can be relied upon to go out of their way to make others feel welcome and to assist, both spiritually and physically, in times of need, sometimes in a totally unexpected way.

It is truly an extended family and special congregation.

## IMPORTANT MESSAGE FROM ARZA

*In response to recent events in Israel, the following (edited) message was sent from Rabbi John Rosove, Chair, Peter Savita, Vice Chair, Membership and Rabbi Josh Weinberg, President of ARZA.*

“On June 25, the Israeli cabinet capitulated to extremist pressure and froze its agreed-upon plan to develop an egalitarian worship space at the Western Wall (*Ha-Kotel Ha-Ma’aravi*). On the same day, it advanced a bill that would grant the ultra-Orthodox Chief Rabbinate exclusive control over conversions in Israel.

Health Minister Yaakov Litzman of the Haredi United Torah Judaism Party welcomed the Cabinet decision as a victory over liberal Jews. According to him, “This decision sends a clear message to the entire world that **Reform Judaism has no access to or recognition at the Western Wall.**”

ARZA – THE ASSOCIATION OF REFORM ZIONISTS OF AMERICA - is part of an international network of like-minded, progressive Jewish voices, working in unison to build a better, more democratic, pluralistic Israel. ARZA strongly condemned both of those outrageous actions by the Israeli government and is committed to speaking up for Reform Jews in Israel.

ARZA has been on the forefront for forty years, supporting programming for congregational lay leaders involved with Israeli issues, NFTY, and Birthright-Israel. We also provide major support to developing Reform/Progressive synagogues and affiliated Jewish Day schools in Israel.

Non-Orthodox Jews in Israel need our ongoing help, now more than ever. Religious freedom and the very soul of the Jewish state are at risk.

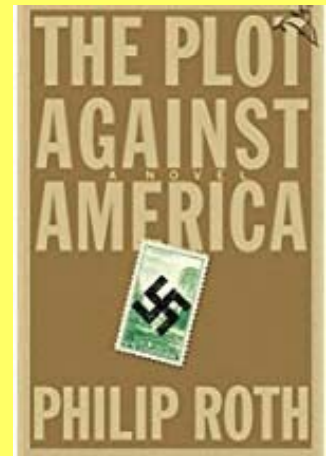
### ***The Plot Against America***

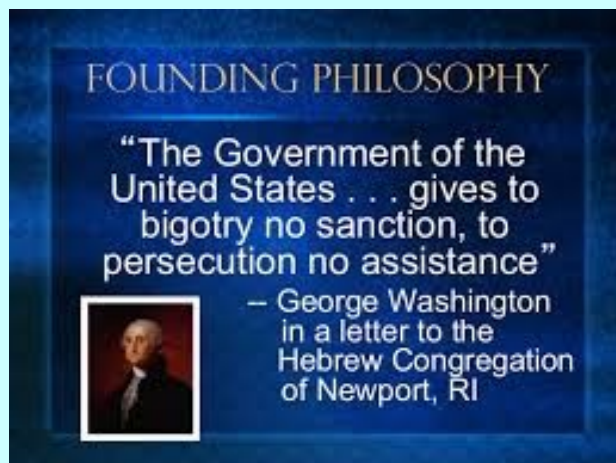
Bridge is an exciting fun game for all - it offers an opportunity to have a challenging experience and to meet other interesting people. (For this session, players should have some experience.)
