CANTOR'S COLUMN BY CANTOR LESLIE FRIEDLANDER

WINTER IS MORE THAN JUST THE WEATHER

While we are now in the middle of a wet and stormy winter, it is comforting for me to remember that February is the last full month of "official" winter. And even though I have always lived in cold climates, replete with four distinct seasons, it seems that I will always think of winter as the one truly transitional season between the insularity of the cold and the openness of warm weather.



Living in an era where we take our creature comforts for granted we often need to be reminded that what has become routine for us also represents blessings for which we should be thankful. The presence of rain and snow, which for us is often no more than a footnote on the evening news, was always a central focal point of concern for our ancestors.

There was a time when most people lived in agricultural societies, in climates where rain is the most important variable in the agricultural cycle. In Israel, rain falls only between October and May, predominantly in the winter months of December, January and February. In fact, rain is so consequential that there are multiple words in Hebrew that differentiate the types of rain – early, late, heavy, light. Even our ancient people understood that rain was essential for the conservation and perpetuity of life.

So important is rain that its descent from heaven signifies the entrance of spirituality into our earthly world. Prayers for rain are among the earliest liturgical texts and rain is regarded as an expression of divine providence. The abundance or scarcity of rain is regarded in the Bible as one of God's means of rewarding or punishing the Israelites, because the "keys of rain" are used by God to chasten people and cause them to repent. Both unseasonable rain (I Samuel 12:18ff.) and drought (I Kings 17) are spoken of by the prophets as signs of God's disapproval. In Ezekiel 34:26 we read, "...that which falls in good quantity and at the expected time is called a blessing."

And as is recited in traditional services during this winter period, "...In [the merit of Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Moses, Aaron, and the Twelve Tribes], favor us with abundant water... For a blessing and not for a curse, for life and not for death, for plenty and not for famine." Let us remember that our ancestors did not simply wait for winter to end. They understood that their survival was dependent upon the success of their partnership with the Creator. The people worked the land while the Creator provided the heavenly nourishment that made life possible. As we move from winter to spring, let us never forget the primacy of this eternal partnership.

What Brought Us to the Door of Our Synagogue? By Steve Fein & Denise Miller

In October 2016, the Isaiah family gathered together in prayer and fellowship for our 50th High Holiday Season and the start of our Jubilee Year. It is a time to reflect on our past and look forward to the future.

STEVE: We arrived at Temple Isaiah via different routes. I came from a Conservative background and was searching for a temple after years of being unaffiliated. I remembered being impressed by Temple Isaiah when I was a guest and had an aliyah at Allie's bat mitzvah. My experience with Reform Judaism to that point had led me to believe that just about all the praying was done in English and that somehow turned me off.

I was pleasantly surprised to hear familiar prayers in Hebrew and familiar melodies that I remembered from my earlier years of growing up and going to Hebrew school. Denise invited me to attend High Holiday services and I enjoyed them immensely, from the impressive chapel of the Community Church to the Kol Nidre Appeal. The need for funds was cited (isn't it always?) and I told Denise I would try to get a donation from one of my clients who had a charitable foundation. I did so and that's when I got "Terried". Terry Joseph convinced me to use the donation as dues and become a member. A year later I was on the board and a couple of years after that, I was the president.

DENISE: In 1986, my daughter Alexandra and I moved to Great Neck to begin a new, uncertain time in our lives in an unfamiliar town. The following year I decided that Allie should go to Hebrew school and I looked around for a synagogue to join.

After attending and not loving services at the other Reform temples in town, I found Temple Isaiah. I was drawn to its small size and to the fact that it met in a lovely, but unpretentious church.

After meeting with Rabbi Steinberg, I was convinced. A synagogue with a woman rabbi, about my age, with children about my daughter's age, made me feel right at home. Truly, on that day I found what was to become my home for many, many years.

BOTH: We have shared many Shehecheyanu moments during our time at Temple Isaiah that we will always treasure: Allie's bat mitzvah; Denise's adult bat mitzvah and reconfirmation; Steve's bar mitzvah redux on the 50th Anniversary of the original; both of us being honored at the annual dinner dance; the congregational trip to Israel; the marching from the Community Church to dedicate our new building; and, most of all, being married by Rabbi Ted, whom



we will always treasure as our rabbi and our friend. The friendships and relationships we have made with other members of the congregation will be an important part of our lives forever.

Tu B'Shevat—"The Other Seder"

Tu B'Shevat is a holiday with biblical roots. Each year the Israelites were expected to bring one-tenth of their fruits to the Temple in Jerusalem as an offering to God. This directive to tithe dates back to the Torah and its deep concern with trees, harvests, and the natural world. Beginning with the Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil in the Garden of Eden all the way through Deuteronomy's injunction against destroying our enemies' fruit trees in times of war, our biblical text is replete with trees, both literal and metaphorical. Indeed, the Torah itself often is referred to as an eitz chayim (tree of life), based on a passage in the Book of Proverbs.

Thus, the Rabbis of the Talmud called Tu B'Shevat the New Year of Trees. Although the celebration of Tu B'Shevat has a long and varied history, the themes most commonly ascribed to the holiday today are the environment and social action. It is considered a festival of nature, full of wonder, joy, and thankfulness for God's creation in anticipation of the renewal of the natural world. During this festival, Jews recall the sacred obligation to care for God's world and our responsibility to share the fruits of God's earth.

It is a tradition during this holiday to plant new trees. In modern times, Tu B'Shevat was nourished by the rise of the Zionist movement, which re-emphasized the Jewish people's connections to the land and the natural world. Jews throughout the world responded by donating trees to mark smichot (special occasions).

In celebration of its century year in 2017, the Great Neck Park District added 100 trees throughout Great Neck. Since Rabbi Tsuruoka led Tashlich services in Steppingstone Park, we felt it appropriate to secure a tree in his honor in the park. We will honor the rabbi with a plaque dedication ceremony during Tashlich 2017.

This year Tu B'Shevat falls on Saturday, February 11, 2017. Please join us for a Tu B'Shevat seder luncheon immediately following services at 12:00 noon. We will have a selection of fine kosher wines and a creative menu featuring the seven species of food native to the Land of Israel and commonly eaten during the Tu B'Shevat seder: barley, dates, figs, grapes, pomegranates, olives, and wheat.

There is no charge for the seder for temple members. However, if you wish to make a donation to the temple in recognition of the tree purchased at Steppingstone, your generosity will be both appreciated and acknowledged.

The charge to attend the seder for non-temple members is \$36 per person.

IMPORTANT NEWS FROM ARZA

On January 11, 2017, in a landmark case, the Supreme Court of Israel gave the State 30 days to find "good cause" why a woman may not read aloud from a Torah scroll as part of praying at the Kotel! A year ago the Israeli government coalition made an agreement with a wide range of Jews from around the world that





included the Reform and
Conservative movements, the
North American Jewish
Federations, and the Women of
the Wall to create an egalitarian
prayer space in the Southern
Kotel Plaza under Robinson's
Arch that is equal in size and in
access to the Northern Kotel
Plaza and would be overseen by
non-Orthodox Jewry.

This is a huge step forward for pluralism at the Western Wall! With this decision, women may be able to pray legally with a Torah at the Western Wall. It also will set the stage for more progressive change in Jewish historic and ritual sites.
