<u>RABBI'S COLUMN</u> Summer Time, Summer Reading: 5774



Summer time is upon us, and as the song goes, "the living is easy." This is the time of year to slow down a bit and enjoy even the little things, like lingering over breakfast with Linda and the Times and an extra cup of coffee. One of the things I love the most during the summer is to catch up on reading. I thought I'd share with you some of books I'm planning to read over the next few months. My selection is a combination of study, preparation and entertainment. I think it's safe to say that most rabbis spend a lot of time studying biblical and religious texts and that continues over the summer. Summertime, is also time to read books in preparation for some the classes I'll be teaching, for ideas for sermons, and for just plain fun. So here's my list:

"No Joke: Making Jewish Humor," by Ruth R. Wisse, 2013. Humor is said to be one of the most recognized response to modernity among the Jewish population. Jewish humor – spanning the modern era from Heine to Singer to Roth – has been our people's way of dealing with the precarious conditions in which they had to live.

"The Great Partnership: Science, Religion, and the Search for Meaning," Rabbi Jonathan Sacks, 2011. Rabbi Sacks argues not only that science and religion are compatible, but that they compliment each other – and the world needs both. Moreover, religion and science are the two essential perspectives that allow us to see the universe in its three-dimensional depth and beauty: science is the search for explanation, religion is the search for meaning.

"Einstein's Jewish Science: Physics at the Intersection of Politics and Religion," Steven Gimbel, 2012. The Nazis denigrated Albert Einstein's revolutionary theory of relativity calling it "Jewish science," an accusation typical of the ideological excesses of Hitler and his regime. But is there *in fact* something inherently Jewish about Einstein's approach to his mathematics and his perception of the physical world? Are there elements of Talmudic thinking in Einstein's theory?

"Like Dreamers: The Story of the Israeli Paratroopers Who Reunited Jerusalem and Divided a Nation," Yossi Klein Halevi, 2013. In 1967 Israel achieved a decisive victory against Egypt, Jordan and Syria in the Six-Day War. Most important to the 19 year old nation was the reunification of Israeli West Jerusalem and Jordanian East Jerusalem won at great cost by a group of paratroopers from the 55th Paratroopers Reserve Brigade. Halevi traces the life paths of seven paratroopers to the present who depict the diverse and conflicting directions Israel has traveled. A good companion book to "My Promised Land," by Ari Shavit, 2013.



"The Frozen Rabbi," by Steve Stern, 2010. This is a novel that recounts how a 19th Century rabbi from a small Polish town ended up in a basement freezer in a suburban Memphis home at the end of the 20th Century. It is a story of what happens when an impressionable teenage boy inadvertently thaws out the ancient man and brings him back to life! (I had this novel on last year's list, but never got to it. Having kept it on ice, I hope to read it this year.)

So that's my list. It is a well known distinction and a source of pride that Jews are called the "People of the book." Somehow, we can't keep from reading and studying. It is my wish that you take the summer months to pick up a book and enjoy. It need not be of Jewish content, although I hope at least one book you might read speaks about Jewish history, concepts or values. Read a book, expand your horizons, but mostly: Enjoy!

A New President of Israel—Is It Good for the (Reform) Jews?

In early June, the Israeli Knesset elected a new president from among several candidates. While the role of president is ceremonial and not an official part of governance, he does have influence in Israel and beyond. Shimon Peres, the outgoing president has been an outspoken representative of Israel in many forums and has instituted opportunities for inclusiveness of all streams of Judaism as well as Islam and Christianity. I had the opportunity to meet with him a few days ago and found him still quite inspirational.



The new president is Reuben Rivlin and he brings with him a past which does not bode well for reform Jews. In 1989, he famously visited a reform synagogue in the US and concluded that what he experienced was not Judaism at all- in fact he referred to it as idol worship! Now this was a long time ago and he has learned a thing or two since then, and in his acceptance speech made a point of saying that he would be the president of all the people regardless of their religious practices. He purports to understand that he must work towards Jewish unity.



We know that ARZA will be watching and alerting us if there are problems in his attitude towards reform Jews. ARZA will lead us in actions that need to be taken to expand President Rivlin's understanding and respect for our stream of Judaism. This is one reason why we should all support ARZA.

Jewish Biographical Films a la Hollywood


