



## **CANTOR'S COLUMN**

### ***DESTROYING THE ENEMY WITH NOISE***

Believe it or not, not all the sounds in our services are meant to be beautiful, prayerful or even pleasant. In fact, one sound is downright ugly.

The observance of Purim in the sanctuary is truly unique in that all sense of decorum is ignored and pandemonium seems to be the order of the evening. It is also unique in that the story we read, Megillat Esther, whose contents comprise most of the service, probably never even took place! One of the fascinating customs that happens during the service is the incoherent noise that interrupts the reader's attempts to mention the name of the story's villain, Haman.



While Haman is certainly the evil character in the story of Purim, he also embodies more than just one government administration's threat to extinguish the Jewish people. In fact, Haman is evil personified.

In the bible, in Exodus 17, at the very end of the portion Beshalach, we read about a battle in the desert between the Children of Israel and Amalek and his people. After having received the Torah at Mt. Sinai, the Israelites, wandering weak and weary, were attacked without provocation by the Amalekites. Remarkably, Joshua and the Israelites overwhelmed the soldiers of Amalek and after the battle God said to Moses, "Inscribe this in a document as a reminder...I will utterly blot out the memory of Amalek from under heaven!" In Deuteronomy 25:17-19 we find another reference to the evil Amalek, "Remember what Amalek did to you...how, undeterred by the fear of God, he surprised you...you shall [therefore] blot out the memory of Amalek from under heaven. Do not forget!" Clearly, according to God's statement to Moses, the descendants of Amalek will forever be the enemy of the Israelites.

And what does this have to do with Haman?

Even before the Israelites' battle with Amalek, the struggle began with those famous warring twins, Esau (also known as Edom) and Jacob (also known as Israel), whom we read about in Genesis. Many years later, King Saul, a descendant of Benjamin, one of Jacob's sons, fought a battle with King Agag, a descendant of Esau, leader of the Amalekites. Although the prophet Samuel directed Saul to kill Agag and his people, Saul, after having won the battle, spared Agag's life. Saul lost his throne because he disobeyed the prophet and ultimately Samuel executed Agag and the memory of Amalek was blotted out once more.



In the story of Esther, Haman is referred to as "Haman son of Hammedatha the Agagite," thus a descendant of Amalek. In both Exodus and Deuteronomy we are commanded to blot out the name of Amalek, which we do during the reading of the story of Esther not with physical violence, but with raging, ugly noise, by drowning out the sound of Haman's name.

When we celebrate Purim we proclaim not only our victory over our enemies, but victory over evil itself. We express it with raging noise - ugly sounds that have enough power to blot out the enemy.

As always, our biblical narrative teaches us more than just history. In most cases, the story also helps to establish our moral roots and moral compass.



In a surprising statement, President Trump said the U.S. is not committed to two states and will accept either one state or two states, whatever Israel and the Palestinians can agree to. Following is the statement by ARZA, the Zionist arm of the Reform movement.

## **ARZA, CCAR STATEMENT ON TWO-STATE SOLUTION, U.S. POLICY**

New York, NY, February 16, 2017 ... The Association of Reform Zionists of America (ARZA) and The Central Conference of American Rabbis (CCAR) emphatically restate our support for the two-state solution. We continue to envision Israel thriving as a Jewish State, living in peace and security alongside a Palestinian State that would fulfill the legitimate national aspirations of its people.

Reform rabbis and Reform Zionist leaders are dismayed that President Trump has backed away from decades of bipartisan US policy supporting the two-state solution. The President opined that a one-state solution might also bring peace. However, given demographic realities in the region, one democratic state between the Mediterranean Sea and the Jordan River would eventually bring an end to Israel's character as a Jewish State. The alternative, Israel's rejecting democracy, should be unthinkable.

We urge the President to return to decades of bipartisan US policy supporting and working to achieve peace through the two-state solution.






