# CANTOR'S COLUMN INVITATION TO A MYSTERY By CANTOR LESLIE FRIEDLANDER

I remember, as a small child, looking at the Hebrew letters I couldn't read or understand and they seemed like a jumble of doodle drawings. I thought that they looked like the burn marks on the top of matzah but I knew enough to know that they made sense to older people.



Even though they now have meaning to me, the letters still seem to hold a certain ancient mystery. It is truly remarkable that the Hebrew letters haven't changed since the fourth century B.C.E., when Ezra the Scribe declared them to be holy and therefore to remain unchanged.

We read in the Book of Ezra (7:10), "Ezra had dedicated himself to study the Torah of Adonai so as to observe it and to teach laws and rules to Israel." Because of this verse there are scholars who believe that it was Ezra who initiated the search for deeper meaning between and within the words and the letters of the Torah. For centuries afterwards people have followed Ezra's lead in the quest for new and relevant meaning in the Torah and in this way our ancient Torah has become the moral guide of the Jewish people and therefore called a *Torat Chayim*, a living Torah.

To protect its sanctity and safeguard the Torah as the centerpiece of Jewish life there are laws and customs that have developed not only around interpreting and questioning its contents, but also concerning the actual construction and art of creating a Torah.

In fact, there is an entire body of precise laws pertaining to the writing of Torah scrolls that specially trained scribes (who are also scholars and artists), known as *soferim*, maintain and put into practice while creating a Torah. The sacred work of a *sofer* is difficult, the artist must be meticulous and it can take up to a year just to write one Torah. The work of a *sofer* is a little-known art that carries a great deal of fascination and mystery, history, ritual, and holds supreme importance to the survival of Judaism.

This year, in celebration of our Jubilee Year, we are planning a Torah restoration project to be led by sofer Neil Yerman. We will all have the rare opportunity to study with him, work with him, to watch him practice his craft and learn about the mystery of writing a Torah. More information will be forthcoming... in the meantime, know that your Jubilee Celebration Committee is hard at work.

## What Brought Us to the Door of Our Synagogue? By Claude Springer

In October, the Isaiah family gathered together in prayer and fellowship for our 50th High Holiday Season and the start of our Jubilee Year. It is a time to reflect on our past and look forward to the future.

When Marcia and I moved to Great Neck in 1962, there was a waiting list to join Temple Beth El. When we did become members there, we stayed for seventeen years. We liked the service but did not feel welcomed. We went to services every Friday night. A professional choir sang from a loft. The congregation seldom sang.

Then we had a small fire in our house, and used the basement as a make-shift kitchen. As a result, we did not attend services for three months. No one from the temple called to find out why we were not coming.

We had heard about Temple Isaiah but knew little about it. About three weeks before the High Holidays in 1979 we called and spoke to the then administrator Florence Levy, who told us we did not have to join now, but to see how we liked the temple after coming for the High Holidays. This welcoming approach was very appealing. The next Friday night we went to the temple (in the sanctuary of the Community Church) and sat down behind a couple, who turned around and said, "Hi, we're Phil and Ruth Fried, welcome." This lovely introduction to the congregation was particularly heart-warming, because the previous seventeen years we had never heard anything like it. The whole attitude of the members and their communal singing was very appealing.

That was the beginning: Rabbis Harold Spivack, Judy Lewis, and Bonnie Steinberg, the hamish congregation, an inclusive Reform service, then joining the board, and becoming president for three years, and then Rabbi Ted, and a building of our own. In between was the problem of hiding the cross up near the ceiling in the apse, that was finally solved by a mechanism devised by a physician friend of mine and father of one our congregants; the building of a new ark by a congregant which was supposed to be light enough to carry off the bima but turned out to be so heavy it required four men to carry it; the concept of the fair share versus a dues structure; whether all members or just those with yahrzeits should stand for the Kaddish—all of these problems resolved in good spirit, to bring about our present day temple and congregation.

So, now I look forward to a new era with Cantor Leslie Friedlander and Student Rabbi Chase Foster, our Torah study again led by a clergy member, and being together with my friends.

# Forbidden Texts: Stories Our Rabbis Tried to Hide


Learning Sessions with Student Rabbi Chase Foster Wednesdays, Dec. 14th, 21st& 28th—7:00pm—8:15pm
