CANTOR'S COLUMNA Thanksgiving Remembrance

While I was growing up – actually, my entire life until a few months ago – my father was a powerful force. Although not a big man, he was physically strong and fit. He was exceptionally smart and read physics and science books for enjoyment – while watching a game on T.V. He loved classical music and could remember melodies and stories behind the music and the composer after one hearing. When you've known someone so well it's sometimes difficult to untangle all the details, but what stands out most about my father was his down-to-earth, practical approach to life.

On the Shabbat during Sukkot we read from the Book of Ecclesiastes and every year its philosophical search would make me think of my father. Ecclesiastes, also known as Kohelet, is really one man's quest for confirmable evidence of God's workings in this world, which he ultimately does not find. What he does conclude, however, is that it is the daily, seemingly mundane, earthly pursuits that ground us and give us purpose in our lives. Our relationship with our spouse, our job, our home and our children – these are the things that should give us ultimate pleasure since we don't know if there is anything more beyond our earthly life. Kohelet insists that we enjoy every moment, while we can.

My father died the day before Sukkot, something I at first felt to be terribly ironic. But with the passing of these few weeks, it makes sense, or at least I made it make sense for me. Our extended family will observe Thanksgiving this year with a memorial service for my father, just as we did last Thanksgiving for my mother. It may seem like an uncanny coincidence, but for two people who were genuinely in love for 73 years, it does make sense.

This Thanksgiving I will be giving thanks for having had my father in my life in a full way, a father who was always levelheaded and taught me to balance my creativity with pragmatism and to always appreciate the seemingly ordinary that isn't at all ordinary.

And the Book of Ecclesiastes will never be the same for me.

Kristallnacht Service—November 10

Henryk Ross (1910-91) was a sports photographer in Poland before the Germans invaded in September 1939. When the Nazis walled off the city of Lodz and incarcerated tens of thousands of Jews, including Ross, Ross began working for the ghetto's Department of Statistics, where he was assigned to photograph identification-card photos. Secretly, he also photographed the devastating realities in the ghetto, which he buried in 1944 as the Germans began liquidating the ghetto. Ross survived the Holocaust, rescued the buried negatives that survived and shared some of the images in the years since. Until recently, most of his photographs have remained unseen.

It's the Hebrew month of Cheshvan, and it's a very interesting month, in that it's the only Hebrew month we don't have some sort of Jewish holiday. As a matter of fact, the Sages even called it MarCheshvan, using the Mar, meaning bitter because of the lack of holidays. But there are other interpretations as well.

The Hebrew word Mar can also be translated as a "drop" (as in water), and Cheshvan is when (at least Biblically) the story of Noah and the floods take place. In addition, Cheshvan began the agricultural season in ancient Israel where we pray for rain. (Notice the extra words, "Mashiv HaRuach, U Morid HaGashem – You cause the wind to shift and the rain to fall" in the T'fila, our Amidah prayer next time you're at services). Today, because of scientific advances, Israel manages water supply for agriculture and electricity (among other things), but that was not always the case, and thus our rabbis saw the need to pray for rain.

I realize that this can easily fall under the heading of "too much information", and I really wanted to show that although there are no holidays in the month of Cheshvan, it is certainly not a month that it is bitter for modern day rabbis and cantors. On the contrary. It is a very productive and busy time for Jewish clergy and congregations, specifically because there are no holidays. We just completed a long and arduous High Holy Day season and we all needed a rest to rejuvenate ourselves and begin in earnest the business of temple life.

During the month of Cheshvan, we also read the weekly Torah portion Lech Lechah, which speak about Abram (before he was called Abraham) being commanded by God to leave his land, his birthplace, and his father's home to a land that God will show him. Cheshvan is a month of moving forward. New beginnings, new adventures, and new things to be learned. We began our Torah study (although technically, that was last Hebrew month), lunch and learns, adult education and many more projects (Yes....Don't forget our Annual Tag Sale). Cheshvan is also the month when the clergy begins to look forward. During lunch and learn, I asked that you submit some subject matter that interests you, and would like to understand more about. I encourage you all to send these subjects to the cantor and me. This will help define some of the topics we will discuss with you in future learning experiences. I would also like to ask you to do the same for adult education.

Cheshvan as you can see is not at all bitter, but full of growth, activity and a sense of moving forward. I hope and pray that this Cheshvan is a productive and meaningful month for you and those you love. That when it rains, let us not just see rain, clouds, and gloominess overhead, but see the potential of new projects we begin together as a community, and that together, we will continue to learn, support and build on the foundation that makes up the community we love and care for so much.

"VOICES OF ISAIAH"

What Brought Us to the Door of Our Synagogue? By David Aubrey

In October 2016, the Isaiah family gathered together in prayer and fellowship for our 50th High Holiday Season and the start of our Jubilee Year. It is a time to reflect on our past and look forward to the future.

It is a paradox worthy of pilpulistic pondering that I am simultaneously one of the youngest members of Temple Isaiah, yet have been here longer than nearly everyone else. Over the last 48 years, I have worshipped with 6 rabbis, 7 cantors, and more presidents than you would find at an Al Smith dinner.



It all began in 1969. My mother's cousin's husband was an old friend of Temple Isaiah's first rabbi, Harold Spivack. My mother, Beatrice Aubrey, got a job teaching at the Hebrew school and I was enrolled in Myra Breakstone's second grade class. After a year's hiatus, we formally joined in 1971 and have been here ever since. My siblings and I became bar-mitzvah here. My father served on the board and built the sukkah every year with Lou Marshall. My mother sang in the choir, performed in shows, worked on the dinner dance journal, and wove the ark covering that we still use. My brother, Jonathan, played flute in the temple's mandolin ensemble.

I remember going to Hebrew school in the basement of our original home on Stoner Avenue. Led by the formidable Esther Raviv, Mr. Amnon from Israel, Dr. Jack Lichtenthal, and Ron Howard with his slightly off-color stories and Chico Marx style piano tricks. I recall the elaborate system we had of shielding Christian iconography at the Community Church which involved pullies and placards by member Sam Fink. I remember Purim carnivals and street fairs in the Grace Avenue parking lot, field trips to Garvies Point and the Poconos.

There were many changes over the years – from a "Classical" Reform service to one with more Hebrew, the first female cantor and rabbi in town, new niggunim, the "Stone" Room becoming the "Shalom" Room and the biggest of all – parading our sacred Torah scrolls through the streets to our new home on Chelsea Place. Through it all, from the philosophy group discussing Emil Fackenheim over bialys to the annual Purimspiel, the auctions and progressive dinners, Rabbi Spivack's archeology slides and Linda Tsuruoka's musicals, the often sublime and periodically ridiculous, Temple Isaiah has always been both a second family and a second home to me. A place where you knew everyone—not just because it was small enough to do so, but because its heart was big enough to make that knowledge worth the effort.


