### CANTOR'S COLUMN With Humble Breath



*Hin'ni he'ani mima'as...Behold me, of little merit, trembling and afraid, as I stand before You to plead for Your people...So intones the cantor, which begins the Erev Rosh Hashanah service.* 

It is, for me, the most soulful, intensely personal moment of the entire year. I beseech God's acceptance of my prayers as representative of the congregation and acknowledge my own shortcomings, imploring God to find favor in my prayers. I plead with God to grant me a sweet and strong voice so that I am able to carry out my sacred task. It is a significant responsibility to carry the weight of an entire community through one's personal prayers,

and particularly awesome at this holiest time of the year.

I choose to sing this prayer unaccompanied, without support of the piano or the choir, as vulnerable and revealed as I can be. It is a singular lonely and scary moment, as it is the one time in our entire liturgy that I implore on my own behalf and not on behalf of the congregation. It is the most personal prayer imaginable, yet it is articulated in the most public manner possible. Its moment comes at the beginning of all the services, when congregants are still fully focused on the bimah and when the thrill of what lies in the hours before us holds an edge that is thoroughly palpable in the air. I am aware that every ear in the sanctuary is attuned to me as I pray for God's ear.

Although I am not so presumptuous as to compare my role with that of Aaron's, still, I am reminded of a passage in Exodus 16:10 when Aaron first had to find atonement for himself before he could intercede on behalf of "the whole assembly of Israel."

It is with humility and a certain amount of healthy apprehension that I approach the High Holy Days and the sacred task with which I have been charged. As I ask for God's indulgence, I also ask for yours.

L'shanah tovah.

# **RABBI'S MESSAGE**

Dear Friends,

Can it be September already? It seems like just a moment ago, it was getting warmer, everyone was going on vacation, and the days were getting longer. Where has the time gone? This is the eternal

question that rabbis and cantors hear all the time. Mostly when we are talking about our golden years. But, this is also the existential question asked in the deepest recesses of our hearts when the *Yamim Noraim – The Days of Awe* are upon us. Where has the time gone?

Lately, I am reminded of the words of the beautiful and moving High Holy Day piyyut (Liturgical poem), "Unetane Tokef" – "Let us speak of the great power of the day". This poem speaks to one of the most central liturgical questions of the High Holy Days, "what will this New Year bring to me"? There are many themes in this 4-part poem, but one that resonates with me is, U'vashofar gadol Yitaka, v'kol d'mamah dakah yishamah – The great shofar will be sounded, and the still small voice will be heard. I understand this to mean, the



sound of the "Great Shofar" will spiritually awaken us and we will hear the still small voice within ourselves. It will open our hearts and minds and allow us to reflect honestly, and thoughtfully on the past year. It is not to trigger guilt, but rather to allow ourselves the room to grow both emotionally and spiritually.

On August 22, we began the Hebrew month of Elul, and it is a magical and profound month marked by the daily sounding of the Shofar. The shrill sounds of the shofar act as a spiritual alarm clock telling us Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur are near.

Elul is a month of self-examination and returning to a godly path. It begins the season of holiness, and marks a time to re-boot ourselves. To cast away the old and perhaps toxic self-images we may be hiding, and to embrace self-healing.

Elul is a month of S'lichot- Forgiveness. It is a time when we both ask for forgiveness from God and our loved ones, but it is also a time when we forgive. We show compassion for other people's errors, but often forget about compassion for ourselves. Elul reminds us that just as we forgive our friends and relationships, so too should we have "Rachmanut"-Compassion for ourselves.

Elul is also the month of love. Our rabbis explain that Elul begins with the Hebrew letter Aleph, and they say that it stands for a verse from King Solomon's moving love poem *Shir HaShirim – Song of Songs* (6:3) which states: *Ani L'dodi v'dodi li – "I am to my beloved as my beloved is to me"*. To the rabbis, this is representative of our relationship with a loving and kind God. Elul is a month when we recommit ourselves to relationships both of Godly proportion, and to relationships between ourselves and the people in our lives.

Many who practice yoga, often set an intention. The intention becomes a focus in the yoga practice and ultimately in one's life. In Jewish tradition, our intention is called Kavannah – Focus/Intention. Kavannah acts as a foundation of mindfulness and awareness in our journey through this month of holiness. With kavannah, we begin to pay attention to "the important things in our lives" that truly mean more than we can imagine, and we gain an understanding for the need of gratitude in our daily lives.

As we enter Elul, and the days before the High Holidays, let us remember to cultivate a sense of gratitude and focus on the important things in life through self-examination and mindfulness. May we release negativity and breath in forgiveness and grace, and may the "Great Shofar" awaken that inner "still small voice" so we may return to a space of wholeness, peace and love.

Arlyn and I wish you and those you love, a *Shanah Tovah U'metukah – A good and sweet year*, and we look forward to meeting you in the temple as we usher in 5778.
