RABBI'S COLUMN

The 3 Dimensions of the High Holy Days A Reflection on Rosh Hashanah 5773



Within a few weeks we will be ushering in Rosh Hashana 5773 marking the beginning of a ten day spiritual process of reflection and renewal for Jews around the world. These days of awe (yamim noraim) consist of special services which overlays the regular weekly worship schedule. While the special services for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur follow the framework of a Shabbat service, there are notable additions to the service unique to these holidays. A good number of the additions are poems (piyyutim, singular: piyyut) composed by various rabbis of the Middle Ages. Unetaneh Tokef is such a piyyut that has been part of the High Holy days for centuries. So important it has become that it is the only piyyut

included in both Rosh Hashanah services and Yom Kippur. Except for *Kol Nidre*, *Unetaneh Tokef* is probably the best known of all the High Holy Day liturgy.

According to legend, Unetaneh Tokef was composed in the 11th Century C.E. by the sage Rabbi Amnon of Mainz in Germany who was horribly martyred defending his faith against pressure to convert of Christianity. Biblical scholarship suggests, however, its origin several hundred years earlier, probably in Israel. Whatever the story of its authorship, its message and powerful imagery had made it part of our traditional service. In the Reform siddur, Unetaneh Tokef immediately precedes the Kiddusha portion of the Amida. After an initial introductory paragraph depicting judgement day, "where even the hosts of heaven are judged," we listen to these stirring words: "On Rosh Hashanah it is written, on Yom Kippur it is sealed: How many shall pass on, how many shall come to be; who shall live and who shall die; who shall see ripe age and who shall not; who shall perish by fire and who by water; who by sword and who by beast; who by hunger and who by thirst; who by earthquake and who by plague; who by strangling and who by stoning; who shall be secure and who shall be troubled; who shall be poor and who shall be rich; who shall be humbled and who exalted. But REPENTANCE, PRAYER and CHARITY temper judgement's severe decree." There is not a year I read these words on the morning of Rosh Hashanah that I am not moved, often to tears, as I think of those whose lives have been sealed on one of these polar paths in the Book of Life.

In this column I'd like to comment on the last verse: "But REPENTANCE, PRAYER and CHARITY temper judgement's severe decree." This verse expresses a formula by which a person may obtain a reduction in the severity of the original decree. Sadly these days, these three words have lost the power of their original force. The liturgists were well aware of this and so in some High Holy Day prayer books you will s find written in small letters above the words "REPENTANCE," "PRAYER" and "CHARITY": "fasting," "voice," and "money" respectively suggesting how to how to implement these three actions. If only fasting for a day, saying our prayers out loud in synagogue, and writing a check were the way to better our life for the next year — how simple life would be! Clearly, this is not the intent. I suggest we ought to look at acts of Repentance, Prayer and Charity in a different way. In a broader sense, these three words can symbolize three dimensions of our being both in this world and beyond our earthly existence, those dimensions being Personal, Spiritual and Universal. REPENTANCE (Personal) are those actions we do to improve our individual being whether it is turning from our old ways to a path to becoming more kindhearted to friends and family, and more ethical in business, practices; or to live a healthier life by stopping smoking or overeating. PRAYER (Spiritual) represents a way of entering into a spiritual relationship with God, establishing a connection between the eternal part of us with the One who is source of all things. Prayer must be practiced daily and actively. CHARITY (Universal) is not just about financial assistance, it is striving for a just and compassionate world, because it is not enough to seek improvement personally and spiritually without caring for other living creatures. It means keeping abreast of the world's needs, adding our voice when support is called for, and lending our hands when talking and a check isn't enough. As you can see, this are activities that need to be addressed all year. I invite you to consider how you can perform acts throughout the year that 1) make you a better person to yourself and to others, 2) help you become one with God, and 3) strive to improve the world with all your heart and means. Truly, if you can do this you can go a long way toward fulfilling for yourself the ancient words of Unetaneh Tokef: "... REPENTANCE, PRAYER and CHARITY temper judgement's severe decree." Linda and I wish you a healthy and wonderful Shanah Tovah. May you be inscribed for Life.

CANTOR'S COLUMN An Awesome Sound



As we move from weekday services, *Shabbat* observances, festival and High Holy Day worship, the music of the liturgy grows more complicated. Weekday service music is very simple, sometimes hardly changing pitches at all within a given phrase. Its essence is quite sing-songy and generally unremarkable. Moving up a level, *Shabbat* music is more melodic and certainly more interesting than that of weekday music, or weekday nusach. And so on we move up the musical liturgy ladder, until we get to the top, to the largest repertoire of musical themes: the Days of Awe, the High Holy Days, observed with elaborate and awesome musical settings that mirror the rich emotions woven throughout the prayers.

These melodies have been borrowed from many periods and places in Jewish history, which give the music for *Rosh Hashanah* and *Yom Kippur* a very rich, expressive fabric.

Surely each of us, through the music, has memories of certain emotionally powerful sections of the service. We can recall the hushed solemnity of *Kol Nidre* and the introspective pleading in the *Hin'ni* prayer. In fact, without knowing anything of the words' intent, we can tell from the music's expression that something awesome and ancient is being proclaimed.

To my ears the musical expression and the sheer passion voiced throughout the High Holy Day music is not only the most complicated of the year's liturgy, but also the most mystical. It also can be the most primal. The sound of the *shofar*, the ram's horn — the essential ritual of *Rosh Hashanah* — has a piercing, alarming quality associated with fear and awe. As we read in Exodus 19:16, "On Mt. Sinai the voice of the shofar exceedingly loud, is heard from out of the thunder and lightening on the mount and frightens the people so that all...tremble." This sound was the long blast that brought down the wall of Jericho (Josh. 6:20); frightened enemies (Judg. 7:8, 22); announced victories (1 Sam. 13:3); signaled revolts (2 Sam. 20:1); rallied the people together (Judg. 3:27, Neh. 4:12-19). At one time the sound of the shofar filled magical roles such as causing much —needed rain to fall, stopping an epidemic of sickness or counteracting evil spirits. Today, Jews outside of Israel hear the *shofar* only on *Rosh Hashanah* and *Yom Kippur* and, in traditional synagogues, at the conclusion of the daily morning service in the month of *Elul*, leading up to *Rosh Hashanah*.

And so it is with almost all of the High Holy Day music. Its drama highlights the significance and expressiveness of the prayer texts. The elaborate melodies become an integral part of the prayer elevating the music itself to something sacred. They offer an awesome introspection into one's soul -- a time for atonement, a time for a new beginning and a time to give thanks that we can begin again.
