RABBI'S COLUMN By Rabbi Jerry Blum

As I begin writing this article, I am also working on the final draft of our Tisha B'Av commemoration service. Even though it's hot out and it looks like rain, this entire process made me think about how intense and complex this entire Hebrew month of Av (or in our case August)

Av in Jewish tradition has always been a month of dichotomies. It is the month that begins with Tisha B'Av – the 9th of Av, the saddest day of the Jewish year. It serves as a reminder of the destruction of both the First and Second Temple in Jerusalem. So deep is the sense of mourning, that our rabbis added other events to the list of calamities to be remembered during Tisha B'Av.



One of the central lessons that Tisha B'Av teaches is that we must be mindful of the way we treat others. We are taught that only through understanding sadness and loss, we can truly know happiness and love. The moment Tisha B'av ends, we are comforted by the words of the Prophet Isaiah as he say's "nachamu, nachamu ami, yomar eloheichem – (Be) comforted (be) comforted my people, says your God" (Isaiah 40:1). We are taken from the darkest moment in the Jewish year and thrust into a moment of comfort, healing and renewal. Our Sages even name the month "Menachem Av – the Comforting month of Av" which is a play on words to suggest that the month can be like a comforting parent.

Six days after the 9th of Av we also celebrate Tu B'Av or the 15th of Av, which is the Jewish Sadie Hawkins day or Valentine's day. It is a day dedicated to the pursuits of love and it was a time when the maidens of Jerusalem would go to the fields and meet their beloveds. As you can see, this is the exact opposite of a day of mourning and sadness.



The month of Av has another significance that is for me the most important. Av becomes the portal into the High Holy Days. The month of Av leads us through a process of self-examination and introspection which brings us to the Hebrew month of Elul, a month that is all about renewal of spirit, refreshing of one's soul and ultimately, the feeling of being reborn again on Rosh HaShanah,

and becoming spiritually cleansed on Yom Kippur.

This year, in addition to all that the month of Av (and August) brings us, we at Temple Isaiah of Great Neck have so much more to celebrate. As part of this coming year's theme of "5779 – Renew / Refresh / Reborn" (you'll hear more about this as we get closer to the Holy Days) we are excited to tell you that through the generosity of many of our dear friends in our holy community, we will begin using the new machzor (High Holy Day prayer book) published by the CCAR Press (the publishing arm of the Union of Reform Judaism) for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Machzor Mishkan HaNefesh is a two-volume set that brings the holidays to life with readings that are touching and relevant, translations that bring new meanings to our traditional prayers and insights into the complexities of the High Holy Day liturgy. Another feature that we have long been waiting for is that the machzor has full transliteration alongside the Hebrew text. This will make our prayer services more inclusive, participatory and hopefully, more inspiring. Both the cantor and I are looking forward to using these machzorim and believe that this will help us expand our understanding and renew our enjoyment of the "Yamim Noraim - the Days of Awe".

To introduce us to the new machzor and some of the innovations and traditions of the High Holy Days, I will be leading a "Brunch and Learn" at the temple on Sunday, August 19th at 11 am. We will get our first taste of the new prayer books and also see how they are different, yet very familiar. We will discuss some of the traditions of the High Holy Days, the liturgy, the choreography of the services, and of course what it all means to us spiritually and emotionally. There will be lots of time for questions and answers so make your lists now and come hungry (there will be lots of good food for thought and our bellies too)

I wish you all a very enjoyable summer and I look forward to seeing you all at the "Brunch and Learn."

Inspiration Through Innovation

Although it may be a distant memory, many of us remember when we began using our new siddur eight years ago. It offered us more choice within our services and wove secular spiritual prayers within our tradition. Egalitarian language was introduced, and our matriarchs were included along with the traditional mention of our patriarchs. Transliterations were included for the first time, which allowed everyone to participate when reading Hebrew. At the time, these changes seemed monumental and thoroughly modern and yes, there was a learning curve when we first used *Mishkan T'filah*. It was our music that

anchored us to our minhag – to our congregation's tradition – and allowed us to retain that familiarity to the worship service.

After more than 30 years, the Reform Movement felt it also necessary to modernize our machzor – the High Holy Day prayer book – with the same eye towards making navigating our prayers and the Hebrew more user friendly and giving us more choice. The result, as we will experience together firsthand in a few weeks, is not only a modernized version of our machzor, but a revolutionary transformation that is, at the same time, steeped in tradition. *Mishkan HaNefesh* not only uses some of the same approaches that were incorporated in *Mishkan T'filah* but goes beyond in its approach to inclusivity and creativity. It is even visually interesting and includes line drawings at the beginning of each service to stimulate the right side of our brains.

One of the biggest modifications is the shofar service, which will hopefully be an inspirational change. At the very least, it will lead to some thought and discussion about why the editors made the choice they did. Instead of the shofar service inserted as a separate element within the Torah service, as is the tradition, the shofar service is spread out and serves as an arch over the entire morning service. I visualize it as a rainbow encompassing the whole Rosh Hashanah morning, a daring change that now makes sense to me. The essential mitzvah of Rosh Hashanah is for each of us to hear the sound of the shofar. Its deeper meaning is its call for us to be introspective and work towards repentance. How much more powerful will that message be when the spectacular sound of the ram's horn is spread out over the entire morning!

But even with all the changes, new poetry, rich visuals and inspirational language, we will retain the most important emotional anchor: our familiar music. I promise very little musical change and a couple of beautiful additions.






