RABBI'S COLUMN By Rabbi Jerry Blum

As I sit in a café, deep in the canyons of Manhattan, I witness an annual phenomenon that I call the "Fall countdown". It's a nervous energy that is almost palpable. Although there is still plenty of time to have a last-minute getaway, you can see the parents with their kids (home from camp already) running with bags full of school supplies, new outfits and that new backpack. You notice more and more people on the streets, back from vacation and hustling past you on the street corners, going somewhere fast. You even notice the shorter days and the cooler nights (ok, not this year), and there seems to be an internal alarm clock that tells us it's time to wake up and start moving ahead.



In our Jewish tradition, this is called Elul, and our internal alarm clock is the Shofar. Elul is

the Hebrew month just before the High Holy Days, but I have begun to see Elul as a verb. I see Elul as an action we take and an internal force that energizes us to see and do things differently. *Eluling* is the act of becoming spiritually aware and focused. *Eluling* is seeing the world anew and noticing new opportunities, and finally, *Eluling* is creating an environment in which we no longer only focus on the way things used to be. We begin to, in the words of Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel, "*live life in radical amazement. Get up in the morning and look at the world in a way that takes nothing for granted."*

With the words of Dr. Heschel in mind (and heart) I am excited to tell you about how we at Temple Isaiah of Great Neck will be heading into 5779 with a sense of Renewal, Refreshment and Rebirth. In the past few months, the board has taken steps to begin a process of reassessment of "who we are". Our holy community has gone through many changes in the past few years, and it is time for us to take a "snapshot" of where we are today, so we can better set a course towards the future. We created a Strategic Planning committee and began to work with UJA/Federation on an analysis project using an exciting demographic analysis process called the "Thriving Synagogues Learning Tool". This is a webbased assessment tool that measures the community's feelings about everything that we do and participate in. This is a confidential online survey that will ask questions specific to our synagogue to better understand how our community feels about our programming, and everyone is invited to use it (and it only takes about 10 minutes).

If you do not have a computer, or are not confident in your technical skills, have no fear. We will be setting up shop in the Temple for people to come by and our committee will help you to sign on. If you can't make it to the temple, we'll even deliver a laptop computer, so you can sign on and help us to be a better and stronger community. Everyone over the age of 18 is eligible to use the tool and we encourage you to ask your families, and anyone else who has participated in programs and services at our temple. We are looking to get 100% of community participation so we can create a roadmap towards the future and grow our synagogue into a cultural and spiritual center for all.

Another new feature that you will encounter when you come to the temple this Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur, is our brand new High Holy Day Machzorim – prayerbooks. You will immediately see the difference in look and feel. The readings are touching and relevant, the translations bring new meanings to our traditional prayers and each page has insights into the complexities of the High Holy Day liturgy. Another important feature, that we have awaited for a long time is full transliteration alongside the Hebrew text. This will make our prayer services more inclusive, participatory and hopefully, more inspiring. Both the cantor and I are thrilled to be using these wonderful new books and so enthused by the support of our congregants in purchasing these machzorim.

Elul is also a time of reflection and self-examination. Each day during Elul, the Shofar is sounded to act as an alarm clock for our soul. The blast of the Shofar awakens the "still small voice" that resides deep inside of us and asks the question, how will we approach the coming year? Will we take a backseat and become a spectator to life, or will we wake up each morning filled with "radical amazement", taking nothing for granted and looking forward towards the future. May we enter Elul with our eyes and hearts wide open, and may we embrace the many blessings that come our way, taking nothing for granted.

Meet Our Musicians



In the year 70 C.E. the Temple in Jerusalem was destroyed and as a sign of national mourning the ancient rabbis declared a ban on public musical performance. Fortunately, the power of music and its influence on the lives of the people must have overwhelmed rabbinic decree, because children continued to sing songs, people continued to whistle, and instrumental music lived on and flourished. In fact, the power of music is so triumphant and so trumped ancient rabbinic authority that the very nature of our services can be contained within our music alone.

Rabbi Jonathan Sacks, emeritus chief rabbi of the United Hebrew Congregations of the British Commonwealth, writes, "There is something about music that intimates a reality beyond our grasp...Music is the language of the soul...the Torah is God's libretto, and we...are the performers of God's choral symphony."

Yes, music has remarkable power to evoke emotion and has the potential to express beyond what mere words can. To this end, we are fortunate to have two extraordinary instrumentalists participate in our High Holy Day services.

Pianist Richard Whitten

Richard Whitten, who grew up in a Christian home, is an organist, pianist, choral and orchestral conductor, and he has directed musical theater productions, including a Gilbert & Sullivan troupe that performs in both Yiddish and English. Not

only does Richard have advanced degrees in piano performance and conducting, but he is a member of the New York Bar and currently does consulting for litigation. For the past few decades he has accompanied services and directed music at both churches and synagogues and while he knows the music, which is to be expected, Richard has gone far beyond that. He not only knows the structure and liturgy of Jewish services, he has a basic knowledge of Hebrew and Yiddish, which floored me when we started rehearsing together.



Richard's son is a consular officer with the foreign service and is currently posted in Rio de Janeiro.

I am confident you will experience the special relationship Richard has with our liturgy. What a difference it makes when the accompanist can move beyond the technical and capture the essence of the feelings that the prayers communicate. On Sunday, October 14th, Richard will be part of an organ recital in Huntington Station, which will be open to the public. We will get more information for those interested in attending.

Cellist Nan-Cheng Chen

On the evening of Kol Nidre we will be privileged to hear the familiar Max Bruch setting of Kol Nidre played by the accomplished cellist, Nan-Cheng Chen. Nan-Cheng was born in Taiwan and at the age of 12, already a skilled performer, came to this country to study at the Idyllwild Arts Academy in California. He then studied at the New England Conservatory



Preparatory Program before attending the Juilliard School, where he received undergraduate and graduate degrees in performance. Each conservatory move was to study with another master cello teacher. Nan-Cheng is currently a doctoral candidate at CUNY Graduate Center and teaches on the faculty at Queens College's Aaron Copland School of Music.

Nan-Cheng, also a consummate educator, is passionate about sharing music with music lovers. He is active in a number of performing ensembles, in addition to serving as executive director and founder of the New Asia Chamber Music Society. He has performed all over the world and has received countless honors and awards. Dear Fellow Congregants,

The slow, hot summer days are coming to an end and the High Holidays are upon us. It is time to put our stored energy to good use. The High Holidays are a time to reflect on the past and look forward to a fresh new year.

The Strategic Planning Committee has been doing just that through the spring and summer, strategizing and reflecting on who Temple Isaiah is, what we want for our future and how to plan to get us there. To help us with this endeavor, Rabbi Blum connected us with the UJA-Federation of NY and their Thriving Synagogue Learning Tool; a program/process/tool to self-reflect and help us direct and focus our attention with the help of some useful tools.

The first step is the **THRIVING SYNAGOGUE LEARNING TOOL SURVEY**, a confidential, anonymous **10-minute survey** letting us know how you, our members, including all family members over the age 18, and our guests, feel about the leadership, sacred purpose, programming and other important areas of Temple Isaiah. The survey is available on-line and is completed on a computer using a web-link that goes directly to the analysts at UJA's partner, the Social Research Lab at the University of Northern Colorado. The link below is available now through September 30th. At the conclusion of the survey, the University, along with the program directors at UJA-Federation of NY, will share the results with our committee and congregation, help direct our path forward, and help us thrive through their many tools for synagogues.

This is an exciting step we are taking. We look forward to 100% participation because we want to know how you feel. The Strategic Planning Committee will be available to answer your questions and to provide computer assistance, if you would like.



I purposely used quotation marks because the organization is much more than just a typical soup kitchen and because it is just a handy way of referring to the facility. Several Saturday mornings each year we are asked by Ladles of Hope to join them in preparing and serving breakfast

and lunch for people in the Hempstead area who are in need. Additionally, others of us sort and distribute seasonal clothing to those who patronize the soup kitchen. Still others of us prepare shower kits to be distributed to those who need to shower at the facility.

During the course of the morning we have the opportunity to interact both with the people coming to the soup kitchen for services and with other dedicated volunteers. As any of those who have previously participated will attest, the entire experience is enriching on many different levels.

Of course, we are always looking for and welcome new volunteers. We are scheduled for two more dates this year: Sept. 15 and Dec. 8. The soup kitchen uses the facility at the Salvation Army Community Center, 65 Atlantic Ave. Hempstead, NY. Generally, volunteers arrive by 9:00 a.m. and stay until approximately 12:30 or 1:00 p.m. Carpools can be arranged. Additionally, donations of seasonal clothing, towels, sheets and toiletries are needed.


