RABBI'S COLUMN By Rabbi Jerry Blum

"To everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven" (Ecclesiastes 3:1)

Do you remember the last time you said, boy, I just have so much time on my hands? Yup, me neither. I keep on saying, it feels like the years are passing by so quickly, and exclaiming, where has the time gone?



This month of February marks the Hebrew month of Adar, the month when we celebrate the joyous festival of Purim, but this year is different as it is a Shanah Me'uberet – a Leap Year (literally a pregnant year). This means that the Hebrew calendar adds an entire extra month in order to balance out the difference between the lunar and the solar calendars so our Jewish holidays (sort of) land in their correct seasons. Does that mean there's more time in our lives? Well, not exactly, but could you imagine celebrating Rosh HaShanah in early August and Pesach in late February?

Of course, there are volumes of Halachah (Jewish Law) regarding leap years and specifically about the months of Adar I and Adar II, but suffice it to say, it just doubles the fun and adds a little extra time to our already cluttered calendar, and this year we will need it with so many events.

By far, the most important event for us in February is the "Gathering of the Scrolls" on Tuesday evening February 5th at 6:00 pm at Temple Emanu - El, 1 East 65th St. New York, NY.

As many of you know, Temple Isaiah is the guardian of a Torah scroll from Czechoslovakia, that was rescued from the horrors of the holocaust. Our Czech Torah MST#785 came from an unknown town in

> Bohemia and Moravia and survived the Shoah in Prague, before being brought to London in 1964.



On the 5th of February, hundreds of these sacred scrolls will be gathered together in a celebration of Jewish culture and survival. These beautiful scrolls will be on display and this will be an evening rich in history, pride and joy, and we would love to have as many Temple Isaiah members there to join in on this momentous occasion.

Because security for this event will be very tight, it is important that you register with the temple, and that we have your name written down on the invitation list at Temple Emanu-El. Please call, or send an email to, isaiahgn@yahoo.com telling us that you want to attend. If your name is not on the list, you will not be admitted to the event. We will reach out to all who will join us so as to facilitate some car-pooling to the city. We hope you all will join us for what promises to be an amazing evening.

Our psalmists tell us to "Teach us to number our days, so we may obtain a wise heart" (Psalm 90:12). Each year this verse takes on new meaning, as I become more cognizant of the blessings that fill my life. The lesson I take from verse 12 this year is to be more judicious with my time. Times spent with family and people we love are the precious gifts that will give us emotional and spiritual wisdom. Embrace these times and remember the words of Rabbi Harold Kushner, "nobody on their deathbed has ever said I wish I had spent more time at the office"

CANTOR'S COLUMN

Blending the Familiar with the New

During the past several years, there has been an ongoing dialogue between the Reform and Conservative Movements and their respective congregations regarding the issue of accessibility of the liturgy as it relates to the music of the prayer service.

Prior to the last decade or two, little thought was given to the need for individual congregants to feel fully involved through their direct participation in the service. Indeed, involvement was deemed sufficient as long as people were "inspired" during prayer, while the role of clergy was to lead. Fortunately,

things have changed, and most congregations now seek a balance between congregants feeling fully involved and empowering the clergy to help inspire and educate.

Creating an effective balance of congregational participation in the service is not a simple, one-solution-fits-all task. Let me explain.

Simple tunes and melodies, including folk music, have always enjoyed popular appeal, both for the beauty of the melody and for the ease that most people feel in being able to participate in singing. In fact, many folk tunes have inspired composers to use these simple melodies as a basis for more complex symphonies and art songs. This is also true of liturgical music. In the synagogue, there is a place for both seeking spiritual fulfillment using simple melodies that lend themselves to full participation as well as more complex arrangements that enable the cantor to inspire through musical interpretation and harmony. Musical notes can be wonderfully familiar and functional while, at the same time, they can also be arranged to produce a multi-level experience that can be something more than "love at first sight."

Creating a successful service is both an art and a science, and satisfaction can only be achieved by creating a full partnership amongst all participants, whether they be members of the clergy, congregants who regularly attend services, or even the occasional worshipper. Fortunately, the philosophy of Temple Isaiah is one of full inclusion and a willingness to evolve. Of course, like life itself, we have learned that the most important goal is to travel the correct path rather than to find the one right answer.

As your cantor, I am never satisfied with simply accepting the status quo and I am continually seeking new ways to create a proper musical balance that includes all elements of participation and inspiration. It is only through this full partnership that we will successfully meet the spiritual challenges of our time and our congregation.


