RABBI'S COLUMN

As I did last year, I started writing this article on the Summer Solstice, and it made me think about vacations and getting out of the city, and just letting my mind have a little rest after a busy and activity filled year in our community.



But as I began to write, something funny happened. I sat down at my computer and my mind went blank. Now before all the jokes and comments (and yes, they are pretty funny) I must say, I was a little taken aback at this apparent brain freeze (strange term for the summer months, but it works). Why now and what does it all mean?

The summer is a time for family fun, vacations and of course leisure time, and I always love how empty the city gets on summer weekends (maybe my favorite part). But something else happens during the summer months as well. There is a sort of lethargy that settles in and we often set things aside and forget about them. They can be trivial things, but some things, such as community and temple life are important not to forget about. On Friday evening, August 9th, I will be once again leading a Tisha B'Av and Shabbat evening service. *Tisha B'Av* is the saddest day of the Jewish calendar, commemorating not only the destruction of the Temple(s) in Jerusalem but remembering many other great calamities that have befallen our people.



As we did last year, I want to explore how the sadness of this day can become a moment of personal spiritual healing, through prayer, open discussion and of course music. I invite you all to join us for this Shabbat experience, and once again, I am looking for 3-5 people who will join me in leading this Shabbat service. I need your help with readings (both poetic and responsive readings) that will hopefully inspire our worshippers. We would meet once during the week, just prior to the service (we'll figure out some good times for everyone), and together, we will choose some relevant and creative readings (in English) that will communicate the lessons that *Tishah B'Av* can teach us about crossing from darkness to light. David Aubrey's Summer Film Festival is Back!





Temple Isaiah Book Group Reads To Kill a Mockingbird Wednesday, July 24th at 7:30pm



This summer the Temple Isaiah Book Group will read Harper Lee's *To Kill a Mockingbird* and consider its themes from a Jewish perspective. Gail Gordon will lead the discussion, which will take place on July 24, 2019 at 7:30.

To Kill a Mockingbird is a novel told from the perspective of an adult recalling her child-hood growing up as the daughter of a small-town lawyer in the Deep South during the Great Depression. The story puts front-and-center issues of moral character, racial justice, the progress of history, the acceptance of "the other" and a child's journey towards maturity. What could be more Jewish than considering those questions? Little remembered aspect of the book: there are Jewish characters and a discussion of Nazism that raises profound questions about how we, as Jews, consider injustices suffered by others. Take note and bring your ideas for a lively discussion.
