RABBI'S COLUMN By Rabbi Jerry Blum

In just a few days, the Jewish community all over the world ushers in one of the most important holidays (and most forgotten), the holiday of Shavuot. As I said last year Shavuot commemorates Z'man Mattan Toratenu – or the Time of the giving of our Torah, but what does Torah actually mean?



Of course, when we speak of HaTorah – THE Torah, is seems implicitly clear that we're talking about the "Five Books of Moses". In addition to the "Five Books" there are also the Nevi'im, the writings of the Prophets, and the Ketuvim, the "Writings" and is considered wisdom literature (perhaps just one step below the words of the prophets, although divinely inspired). These all make up the TaNaKh (or the Tanach) and is considered the "Jewish Bible", but what about the rest? Meaning, what about the "Oral Law"?

Pirke Avot 1:1 says:

Moses received The Torah at Sinai and transmitted it to Joshua, Joshua to the elders, and the elders to the prophets, and the prophets to the Men of the Great Assembly. They said three things: Be patient in [the administration of] justice, raise many disciples and make a fence round the Torah.

But I do not read the text as is translated above. The Hebrew is a little different and in these small differences, we can begin to read and understand Torah through an entirely different lens. The Hebrew says, "Moshe kibeil Torah miSinai u'm'sarah l'Yehoshua – Moshe received Torah on (Mount) Sinai and transmitted the tradition to Yehoshua".

Notice the lack of the definite article in the word Torah. The Hebrew does not say HaTorah (The Torah) as does the translation above, but rather it points out a non-definitive understanding of what Torah they are actually talking about. It goes on to say that Moshe transmitted the tradition to Yehoshua saying that perhaps Moshe gave the Torah in a written form and an oral (and more interpretive) form to Yehoshua.

I have said many times before that translation is interpretation and thus, even in the most traditional forms, we are still interpreting text. So, what does that mean in terms of Shavuot?

On Shavuot, it is a tradition that we learn Torah. We gather insights and we study all night in something called a "Tikun Leil Shavuot" or (literally a Fixing of the Shavuot evening – or plainly a night of Torah learning). This year on Saturday evening June 8^{th (}beginning at 7:30 pm) we will have our first Tikun Leil Shavuot in a very long time, and we will examine one of the most intricate of the Ten Commandments, number 6, "Thou Shalt Not Murder" (but can you kill?). We will look at this commandment critically through the lens of an Attorney, a Therapist and a Rabbi, and I hope through your eyes as well.

There will be a panel discussion with a question and answer period, and I invite you all to become part of our learning process, and of course, there will be cheesecake (because what would Shavuot be without it?)

Join us as we interpret and reinterpret our greatest source of wisdom, Torah! Become part of our ongoing tradition to continually see our Torah through many lenses and rejoice in the differences of opinion that is part of our Jewish tradition for ages and into the future.

This morning I happened to have been teaching a section from the Book of Leviticus that included the Holiness Code. Two of the verses deal with the rights of the needy at harvest time, which made me think of Shavuot. We are commanded to leave a part of our vineyard unharvested so that the poor and the stranger can either reap for themselves or gather the gleanings left on the ground.

We read the Book of Ruth on Shavuot, and this morning, as we read those two verses about leaving gleanings on the ground, I recalled a scene from the Book of Ruth when Ruth happens to arrive at the field of Boaz, who just happens to be Ruth's kinsman and a truly gracious man. Boaz deliberately leaves grain in his field for Ruth



to glean and we watch a beautiful story unfold – a story of romance, familial lineage, and divine providence. The verses are chanted to a biblical melody so lovely and haunting and the narrative is so compelling and rich that it has more in common with contemporary drama than with a traditional bible story.

<u>Are you over 70 ½? Here's a way to save on taxes</u> <u>and benefit Temple Isaiah</u>

If you or your spouse are 70 ½ or older and are taking required minimum distributions (RMD) from your taxable retirement accounts such as an IRA, there is an often overlooked provision in the tax code that you may not be taking advantage of. This provision, which



the IRS calls a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD), allows anyone aged 70 ½ or older to donate money from their IRA account <u>directly</u> to a charitable organization (like Temple Isaiah) without the gift counting as income to you, and without paying tax on the distribution.

Even better, any money you donate via one of these distributions reduces that amount you must take in required distributions that year.

A further benefit of using this strategy is it helps reduce your Adjusted Gross Income (AGI). Your AGI determines how much of your Social Security is subject to income taxes. Most brokerage firms can assist you with making these donations directly to the charity of your choosing.

I hope I have not left your head spinning. If you want to learn more, I encourage you to discuss your own personal tax situation with your tax preparer or accountant.


