RABBI'S COLUMN

As many of you know, in just a few days, I will be blessed by officiating at the wedding of my daughter and her fiancé. Of course being the father of the bride is such a joyful experience, and yet, with all the preparations, making of lists, keeping to schedules, and working with all the vendors and venues, the time before this, or any wedding becomes one of the most stressful times in one's life. Weddings are filled with joy, and yet the pre-wedding urgencies can reduce even the strongest participant to a pool of tears. Hardly what you'd call joyful and can begin to make



you hate the process. With all the many things that can go wrong, (I can give you a list), and all the frustrations that go along with these moments, it's amazing that more people don't elope. The real downside here is, much of the joy and happiness of the moment gets lost, and our eyes, and hearts no longer see or feel anything but annoyance, and frustration. We forget that there are blessings hidden in all of these experiences. I know this has happened to me during this time, and It feels unsettling.



As I write this message, we, the Jewish community, are within a seven-week soul journey. It is the prelude to the High Holy Days, and it is a time of reflection, renewal and teshuvah. Teshuvah is often translated as atonement, but in this case, I see teshuvah as a returning to one's self, or a turning inward to a space that allows us to grow emotionally and spiritually. It becomes more of a state of being rather than a deed one must do. This state of mind allows us to see ourselves as clean slates year after year beginning with Rosh HaShanah, alive with personal freedom to try new and exciting things, and of course, notice the small but precious blessings that surround us every day.

The Mussar movement (the school of ethical thought) teaches about the concept of *Hakarat haTov* or, recognizing the good that is around us, but it can be simply defined as an "attitude of gratitude". Mussar teaches that gratitude is the ability to recognize the good in any situation, and to give thanks, but there are so many things that stand in the way of this. In the 11th century Mussar classic *Duties of the Hear*t, Rabbi ibn Paquda teaches that there are three things that keep us from being grateful; 1) We become too occupied with material things. How much more "stuff" do we need? 2) We take things for granted, which means, we fail to recognize the bounty of everyday blessings, like a roof over our heads, food to eat and a generally safe environment in which we live. 3) We focus on the negative, meaning that we tend to focus on mistakes people make, and the small hurts we receive from loved ones, and don't notice the positives they do for us.

Perhaps one of the main keys to Teshuvah is adopting an attitude of Hakarat HaTov and recognizing the beautiful moments of personal growth that can be had through heartfelt and honest discussion with loved ones. Getting to a deeper level of relationships with those we love and begin to proactively seek out those small blessings that are sprinkled throughout our days and our lives.

Rabbi ben Zoma said,

"Who is wise? The one who learns from everyone!

Who is mighty? The one who rules over themselves!

Who is rich? The one who is happy with what they've got!

Who is honored? The one who shows honor to others!" -Pirke Avot 4:1

<u>CANTOR'S COLUMN</u> ENTERING THE HOLY DAYS

One of the most mysterious and stirring passages in the Torah is a brief incident between Moses and God when God's essence is established. Moses pleads with God to allow him to see God's Presence. In reply, God places Moses in the cleft of a rock and, shielding Moses' sight, allows Moses to see God's back as God passes by (Ex. 33:22).

The words God speaks to Moses at this moment (Ex. 34:6-7) are words that describe God's relationship to human beings and have become known as the "Thirteen Attributes of God." These two verses are the cornerstone of the



Selichot service, the service of penitential prayers designed to awaken us to the significance of the High Holy Days that are said just days before Rosh Hashanah:

Adonai,
Adonai,
God
compassionate
and gracious,
slow to anger,
abounding in kindness
and faithfulness.

Extending kindness to the thousandth generation,
forgiving iniquity,
transgression,
and sin,
and granting pardon.

Although the words appear in our liturgy during the High Holy Days and at festivals, they don't exactly form a prayer — there is no petition, simply a description, in very human expressions, of God's qualities of mercy. We have these words as a model to show us how, through our own actions, we can be our best selves.

Experience an evening of learning, praying, beautiful words and moving music as we enter the Holy Days.






Temple Isaiah Book Club Thursday, October 17th, 7:30pm "Shanghai Refuge" By Ernest G. Heppner


