### **RABBI'S COLUMN** By Rabbi Jerry Blum

Everyone knows the story of Hanukkah and the miracle of the oil. The Greeks defiled the Great Temple in Jerusalem and the Hasmoneans lead a revolt to take it back. When they were finally victorious, they desperately wanted to rid the Temple of idols and anything Hellenistic and of course light the Menorah, but they needed consecrated oil. During their search, they were only able to find a single cruse of oil that would be enough to light the Menorah for only one day, As the story goes, they lit the Menorah and the oil lasted for eight days, thus we commemorate the holiday of Hanukkah by lighting our Hanukiyyot (our Hanukkah menorahs) for eight consecutive nights, placing



them in our windows for the mitzvah of Pirsum HaNeis, (literally, publicizing the Miracle), so people can see the lights shining from the streets and we can be reminded of our victory over the evil captor.

This is such a great story, with all the trappings of a Jewish holiday. They tried to kill us, we won, let's eat (someone has to eat all the latkes and sufganiot – jelly donuts), and in fact, this is the barebones story we find in the Talmud telling us about Hanukkah, and of course the rules about lighting the Hanukkiah lights. Yet, this is not the whole (or even real) story of Hanukkah found in the Book of the Maccabees. The real story in the text is far more sinister and darker, and not very pleasant at all, so it begs the question, why do the Sages of the Talmud want us to only know about the miracle of the oil and even publicize it?

First of all, the Rabbis of the Talmud had a few bones to pick with the Hasmoneans (remember, the Pharisees were their favorites – you remember that, right? Only kidding), and didn't want them to get all the credit, plus they were very uncomfortable with the idea of military victories, and especially when the victories were maintained with allies like the Romans. Not the message they wanted to send.

Very simply stated, they understood as we do now, that we need miracles. With all the bad news in the world (and there has always been bad news), it's an emotional and spiritual gift to notice miracles in our lives and to celebrate them. I believe the rabbis of old understood the human condition, especially with all the hatred that surrounded the Jewish communities in the diaspora. They knew that we need to publicize the miracles in our lives and in our heritage in order to feel the connection with our tradition.



That same concept is in play right now. With all the hate and specifically the rising tide of blatant anti-Semitism, we need now, more than ever before to be cognizant of the miracles in our lives and be prepared to publicize them. We can no longer afford the luxury of not saying anything or not standing up for those who are made into "the other". We can't allow for people to live in fear

because of what religion they practice, or that they wear a kippah or a hijab. Noted historian Deborah Lipstadt in her recent book "AntiSemitism: Here and Now" said:

"When our children fear there is danger in openly identifying as a Jew, it is indeed something that should concern us all."

The rabbis of the Talmud were right. Their prescription for the hate and injustice that surrounded them was to shine a light in the darkness. To publicize the miracle of hope and freedom. To stand up in the face of injustice and be proud that our heritage teaches tolerance, understanding and Ahavat Chinam, boundless love (my translation), so if you are able, place your hanukkiah (use the electric one please) in the window of your home to publicize the miracle of our day, that we all can come together as human beings to fight hate, and make our communities a safer and more understanding environment for everyone.

Wishing all a joyous Hanukkah.

# **<u>CANTOR'S COLUMN</u> A FEAST FOR THE EYES** By Cantor Leslie Friedlander

While most of our holidays are a feast for the ears, Chanukah serves to emphasize visual observance and rituals and the Chanukah candles are our visual delight. Unlike all the other Jewish holidays and festivals, there are no official ancient prayer melodies for Chanukah, most likely because historically Chanukah is primarily a home observance. In fact, there is an abundance of music for each of the other special days throughout the year, but for Chanukah there is no true *nusach* or melody.

When we think of any other holiday the first thing that comes to mind, at least for a cantor, is a musical motive, or what I refer to as the musical "logo" or "jingle" of the special day. On Rosh Hashanah we hear the shofar and the special High Holy Day melodies and on Yom Kippur, in addition to the High Holy



Day melodies, we confess verbally – another "hearing" ritual. On the festivals of Pesach, Shavuot and Sukkot we hear the beautiful festival music and perhaps the chanting of one of the appropriate megillot and its respective trop melody. Purim has its own megillah chants. These are all auditory and oral expressions of the holidays – feasts for the ears.

The one melody most of us associate with Chanukah is not necessarily a synagogue chant but a tune that is actually an amalgam of two or three German folk tunes that became popular in the eighteenth century – the tune we use to sing *Ma'oz Tzur*. There is, of course, folk music, lots of children's songs, and a small amount of concert music composed for Chanukah, in particular, the great oratorio *Judas Maccabeus*, composed by George Frideric Handel in 1747, and still considered one of his greatest works. Note, however, that Handel is not a Jewish composer and he did not necessarily compose for the Jewish community.



The celebration of Chanukah is expressed by the use of the hand and the eye. We light the Chanukah lights with our hand and observe them with our eyes. In fact, Chanukah is truly set apart from the other holidays by minimizing the importance of song, while maximizing the visual cues that form the foundation of this extended celebration.

As we light the Chanukah candles at the darkest time of the year may we watch them glow and remember the courage and spiritual strength of the Jewish people who fight to preserve our identity throughout history.




