### RABBI'S COLUMN By Rabbi Jerry Blum

The other week we celebrated the first of the four special Shabbatot prior to Pesach (Passover) meaning that we had 45 days until the first seder (AHHHHH!). Yes, that's right, it's that soon, but never fear, because there is so much that happens before we take a bite of that first yummy morsel of matzah (you don't seem excited).

Don't worry, we have plenty of time before we celebrate the exodus from Egypt, because we have to celebrate (and I do mean celebrate) the Hebrew month of Adar, and as the old Talmudic saying goes "MiShe'nichnas Adar, marbim b'simchah — When one enters into (the Hebrew month of) Adar, they shall increase their joy". Adar is truly a month of joy, and the centerpiece of this month is Purim, the holiday that celebrates the victory of good over evil as played out in the capital city of Shushan in the time of King Achashveros (more than a few years ago). Our main characters were Mordechai, and his niece Esther (Haddasah in Hebrew) who saved the Jewish population from annihilation at the hands of the sinister Haman (boooooo!)

The story of Purim is of course the (silly) textbook definition of a Jewish holiday; they tried to kill us, we won, and we "Nosh on Hamentaschen" (or, we eat), but something is missing in the mix. You guessed it, the story of this miraculous victory over the forces of evil is missing ... God! As a matter of fact, Megillat Esther is one of



two books in the entire Jewish Bible that does not mention God explicitly (extra credit if you can tell me the other book). "Hester panim" or "the concealed face [of God]" is central to the theme, but in reality, God is not that concealed in the story. In the case of Purim, hester panim is intimated by the name of our heroine, Esther. The Babylonian Talmud tractate Hullin 139B states, "From where does the Torah bring the name Esther? From the verse 'But I [God] will surely conceal my face ["haster astir panai"] on that day for all of the ill that they have done—for they turned to other gods. (Deuteronomy 31:18)." The name Esther is interpreted as an extension of the phrase for a "concealed God [astir/Esther]." The story of Esther is about how

our heroine "conceals" her identity in order to save her Jewish community and the Biblical commentator Ibn Ezra wrote that the story of the Jews in Shushan and their perils were brought on because of how the Jews assimilated into the non-Jewish community, thus hiding their identity and ultimately forgetting their heritage, and all it took was someone who wanted to destroy the Jews. Haman (boooooo) was the creator of the plot against the Jews and in the end of our story, Esther came out of hiding, persuading the king to save the Jews and of course his Jewish Wife Esther. (Or was that Haddasah?)

You see, in a time of assimilation, where the Jewish community of Shushan lived in relative peace, all it took was one hater to define who the Jews were. Jean Paul Sartre said in his essay "Anti-Semite and Jew", "if the Jew did not exist, the anti-Semite would invent him", and thus in Shushan and in countless Shushans over the world, (think present day Europe and America and Nazi Germany) the Jew had been called out and exposed by those who would hate us, even though we hid behind the mask of assimilation. In the Megillat Esther, we find ordinary people doing godly work. We see how the actions of an individual could change the course of history and save an entire nation. We learn that all it takes is for someone to take a stand against hate and miracles can happen.

As it turns out, the story of Esther and Mordechai may be something of a midrash (a textual interpretation of a Biblical story) that gets us to understand that even though God does not always seem present, we have the gift of godliness within us. All we have to do is to channel our inner Esther or Mordechai and we can again partner with God, taking a stand against hatred, and making real change in this world.

As we celebrate Purim this year, let us believe in our own inner strength, and our inner godliness and let us together bring around a time of peace for our nation, for our global Jewish community, "v'al kol yoshvei teivel" and for all who inhabit this earth, and may we all become "marbim b'simchah – spreaders of joy through the land".

I am just giving you some ideas, now you should start thinking about what you can bring, but if you can't, your entrance will be covered by the costly amount of \$10.


So what do Eric and Helman do? They are well known auctioneers in the circuit, and are offering their services to our temple out of the goodness of their hearts.




We will look forward to seeing you there, and as usual, we will have refreshments to warm the cockles of your heart. I don't know, maybe even wine.

# US ELECTION FOR 38TH WORLD ZIONIST CONGRESS How to Vote

#### STEP 1

Go to: www.ZionistElection.org and click on the 'Register & Vote' button.

#### STEP 2

The registration form will now appear on your screen. Please fill out all the required information, then click 'Submit.'

#### STEP 3

A form asking for a verification number will now appear on your screen. Retrieve your verification number in your email or by text message. Enter the verification code and hit 'Submit.'

#### STEP 4

A payment page will then appear. Select your method of payment and complete the payment section. Once you have entered in your payment information click 'Submit.' The acceptable payment methods are: American Express, Visa, Mastercard, Discover, PayPal, Apple Pay, Google Pay, Debit Card, ACH/e-check, personal check (for paper ballots\* only).

\*Paper ballots are available at www.azm.org/elections.

#### STEP 5

You are now ready to vote for the Reform Slate! You will be asked to provide your email address and a 'Voting PIN Code.' You can retrieve your 'Voting PIN Code' by text message or email. Enter the information and click 'Submit.'

#### STEP 6

Select the "Vote Reform: ARZA Representing the Reform Movement and Reconstructing Judaism" option! We will be listed 2nd on the ballot. Choose only one Slate. Click the 'Submit' button to confirm you are voting for the slate you want and click the 'Vote' button.
