Welcome to the happy (Hebrew) month of Kislev, although these days, happy does not always seem to describe our lives. With the nation going through changes on so many fronts, and the second phase (or is that third - I can't keep track) of Covid, there does not seem to be a lot of light out there to bring us guidance, nor warmth.

Kislev is the month we celebrate Hanukkah and as can be expected, our Rabbis of the Talmud were confused as to how we should celebrate. There was much discussion about the Hanukkiyah (the Hanukkah Menorah), how to light it, and what the light can be used for (yup, those Rabbis LOVED to peel back the onion), but what they really argued about is why we celebrate in the first place.

Anyone who is a student of Jewish history knows the Hanukkah story we tell our children (and lots of adults too) is just that, a children's tale. There was no miracle of the oil and we're not really sure where the eight days comes from (some suspect it is a substitute for a Sukkot that was missed while the Maccabees were fighting). The real Hanukkah story is mostly about civil war waged between different sects of the Jewish population who were backed by the various Selucid armies. Apparently, these warring factions could not agree as to how the government should be run. Sounds kinda familiar? Coming back to present times, add on economic issues and a Covid pandemic part two (or is that three), and many of us might feel the same way we did back in March or April, alone, sad, anxious and in need of some healing, but how?

A while ago, I told a story about Winnie the Pooh and the healing powers of "just being there" for family, friends and loved ones.

It occurred to Pooh and Piglet that they hadn't heard from Eeyore for several days, so they put on their hats and coats and trotted across the Hundred Acre Wood to Eeyore's stick house. Inside the house was Eeyore.

"Hello Eeyore," said Pooh.

"Hello Pooh. Hello Piglet," said Eeyore, in a Glum Sounding Voice.



"We just thought we'd check in on you," said Piglet, "because we hadn't heard from you, and so we wanted to know if you were okay.

Eeyore was silent for a moment. "Am I okay?" he asked, eventually. "Well, I don't know, to be honest. Are any of us really okay? That's what I ask myself. All I can tell you, Pooh and Piglet, is that right now I feel really rather Sad, and Alone, and Not Much Fun To Be Around At All. Which is why I haven't bothered you. Because you wouldn't want to waste your time hanging out with someone who is Sad, and Alone, and Not Much Fun To Be Around At All, would you now.

Pooh looked and Piglet, and Piglet looked at Pooh, and they both sat down, one on either side of Eeyore in his stick house.

Eeyore looked at them in surprise. "What are you doing?"

"We're sitting here with you," said Pooh, "because we are your friends. And true friends don't care if someone is feeling Sad, or Alone, or Not Much Fun To Be Around At All. True friends are there for you anyway. And so here we are."

Each time we reach out to others, we bring a little light into their lives, and that light shines back on us, just by being there.

On Hanukkah, we display our Hanukkiyot in our windows to make the statement that we will not be brought down by hate and fear. That we will find hope by shining a light in the darkness and finding a way to support each other in our community. We stay strong by "just being there" for our family, friends and especially, our Temple Isaiah family, and we bring the warmth of light by joining together in prayer, learning, social times, music, and friendship.
