

## RABBI'S COLUMN

This early afternoon, as the last moments of our holiday season wane, I sat in our temple sukkah one last time for the year and took in the sweetness and the tranquility of the moment. Simchat Torah was just ending, and my mind turned to the coming Hebrew month of Cheshvan which is characterized with absolutely NO Jewish holidays. Certainly, a respite for both congregants and the clergy alike, but this also leaves me some time to reflect on the past few weeks of services as well as everything else that occurred this past year, and how they affected me spiritually. [It was that kind of moment]



For me, this past year has been life-changing on so many levels, both physically, spiritually and on a familial level. I have been afforded so many blessings (even blessings that come from not so happy moments) and I wanted to take some time to practice the Jewish concept of *Hakarat haTov*, literally meaning, recognizing the good, or as is better known, *gratitude*.



## My Temple Isaiah Story By Amy Gorman

The date.....September, 2003. Howard and I were looking for a place to hold Jacob's Bris. New to Great Neck, I called around to Temples in the neighborhood. When I called Temple Isaiah (then located on Stoner Avenue) I spoke with our Dear Cathy Reibstein. After speaking with her, I remarked how friendly and down-to-earth she was. Through a colleague and friend of mine, we ended up having the Bris at Young- Israel of New Hyde Park.

Soon after we joined the Temple, the New Members' Dessert Party at the home of June and Allan Feldman was especially personal, welcoming and of course delicious.

When Shelley Sherman and Ruth Isaac of the Ritual Committee called to see if I would like to read at High Holiday Services, I was honored. After reading, as I walked off the Bimah, I was exhilarated with a spiritual connection to Temple Isaiah and all of our Ancestors.

During the pandemic, Kathie Davis and her Caring Committee, and the Bake Sales were excellent vehicles to help Temple members stay connected and maintain the sense of a strong and caring Temple Isaiah family.
