RABBI'S COLUMN

Welcome to the Hebrew month of Kislev, the Hebrew month of Hanukkah and this year, the Hebrew month when Thanksgiving once again coincides with Hanukkah. Sometimes, because of the magic of calendars and numerical sequences, a small miracle happens, and the festivals of Hanukkah and American Thanksgiving fall out on the same day. This last happened just a few years ago in 2013, when Jewish communities throughout the US renamed this holiday, "Thanksgivikah", and what a joyous time it was. Rabbis, along with entire Jewish communities had a field day with it making it a time for Turkey and Latkes, instead of the traditional stuffing (or was that latke stuffing... OK, now I'm getting hungry). Interestingly, this occurrence was not as rare as it sounds. According



ting hungry). Interestingly, this occurrence was not as rare as it sounds. According to Chabad.com, this had happened quite a few times before and will happen next in 2070. (I can't wait!)

Thanksgiving is my favorite holiday for so many reasons, most importantly to me because it is the ultimate reminder that I have so much in my life to be thankful for, but I don't believe for a moment that gratitude is a-one-day-a-year thing. In Hebrew, the concept of gratitude is called *hakarat hatov*, which literally means **recognizing the good**, and this must become a daily ritual to search out the blessings, miracles and **good** that are in our lives.

The most famous story about **Hanukkah** is the miracle of oil that lasted 8 days. Whether this story is real or not, the festival of **Hanukkah** is a reminder that miracles happen all the time and we must work on recognizing the good in our lives and in the world we live in. We must focus on the *nisim b'chol yom*, the small (and maybe hidden) everyday miracles that surround us, yet often go unnoticed.

This year, the first Hanukkah candle is lit on the Sunday of Thanksgiving weekend, and for me, the message of this convergence of my two favorite holidays is that we must look in every corner, turn over every stone and seek out all the blessings and miracles that happen around us each day. Let us begin to recognize the good, even if there is a considerable amount that is not so good happening around us. Spend a few moments acknowledging that even though we may have many hardships and stressors, there are still small miracles that abound.

A few years ago, I suggested trying a small mindfulness practice. Maybe it's time to try it again. Spend three minutes every day quietly noticing the blessings and miracles in your life and write them down each day for a month (or more). Next Kislev revisit the list and feel the gratitude of all the gifts left for you. And if you feel so inclined, I'd love to talk to you about them. As the poet Everett Hoagland said, "Help us to see ourselves in all creation, and all creation in ourselves, ourselves in one another."

May we all be blessed with a multitude of miracles, and may we give ourselves the gift of time to recognize the good in every one of them.

From my family to yours, I wish you a meaningful Thanksgiving and Chag *Urim Sameach*, a happy Festival of Lights.

All sessions will be held on Zoom at 7:30pm



I did not, and thought it was very personal and conveyed a strong emotional connection to our Temple.

When I was a kid my parents didn't join a temple even though they instilled many Jewish customs in me. It wasn't until I married my second husband that he shared with me his strong Judaic beliefs, including joining a Reform Temple and participating there.

I was even a Bat Mitzvah, part of a B'nai Mitzvah group, in 2000, but unfortunately my husband died a few months before my service. He did know that I was studying for it. When I moved to Great Neck in 2005, I wanted to join a temple. I first attended a Friday night service at Temple Emanuel (where my late husband, who brought up his kids in Great Neck, was a member and had been active). They had a different Rabbi then, who has since passed on. I found myself uncomfortable with the unusual prayer book they used.

I then went to a Friday night service at Temple Isaiah (at the old location on Stoner Avenue). That night there was a B'nai Mitzvah going on which was to be continued on Saturday morning. While I rarely attended Saturday morning services, I wanted to see the end of the B'nai Mitzvah. After the service everyone was so very friendly. I especially remember Meg Grass and a few other ladies.

It still wasn't enough to convince me to join, although I attended services on my personal yahrzeit dates and I bought tickets for the High Holy Days. After about two years, Cathy Reibstein convinced me to join, and I've been extremely happy here ever since.

I owe a big "Thank You" to Meg Grass and to Cathy Reibstein.




ber, I began learning and working with her as the **new Office Manager**, and boy, do I have some big shoes to fill!
