RABBI'S COLUMN

As we quickly approach the winter solstice, with our days getting shorter and the darkness of our winter sky's feeling even darker, I often marvel that our holiday of light, *Hanukkah*, falls just when we need a little extra brightness and **light** in our lives. The cold and the loneliness of the winter months often has many of us shut in and kept separated from the rest of the world, especially in the last couple of years.

In our Jewish tradition, *Light* plays a major role on many levels, and is the nexus to all of creation. With one Divine utterance "*Let there be Light*" there was an immediate separation from darkness and a *spiritual light shone through the universe*, but this was no ordinary *light*. That first *light* did not belong to this world. Rather, it was an emanation of a different essence, from the other side of reality. According to our Torah commentators, *this light served as the symbol of all that is good, beautiful, and positive in this world and our lives.*

A few years ago, I asked myself, *how can I become the light?* How can I use this primordial light, created on the first day as my inspiration? What can I do in this world to shine *light* onto darkness and what is my role in bringing healing to this world? How do I become an effective leader of change, for my community, for my family, for me? And where do I ultimately find the strength and the will to carry on, even when this world we live in feels so broken at times. I found my motivation in the stories and traditions of Hanukkah.

Rabbi Adin Steinsalz wrote "the festival of *Hanukkah* is expressed by the ceremonial lighting of candles, which increase daily in number thus symbolizing exactly how *light exceeds darkness* in this festival of victory, purification and historic upheaval." The message of Hanukkah is that we must become the bearer of *light* and shine that *light* on difficult issues. It is our responsibility to *become the light* and to carry the message of equality and fairness to all corners of this land. We must teach lessons of peace and understanding and engage with all people in the holy work of building a world that has a foundation of *Chesed – Loving kindness*. We must *believe in the sun, even when it is not shining,* because hope is in the *light*.

But the reality is, it's difficult to lead the charge against the darkness as just one single human being. What can I accomplish as an individual when the odds are stacked against me? This week, I found inspiration not from Torah, or our Sages, but rather in the words of a modern-day prophetess who was born in Palestine in 1911. Her name was Sarah Levi – Tanai and she was of Yemani-Jewish descent. After her studies, she became a teacher of music and dance and ultimately became Israel's foremost choreographer, songwriter, and lyricist. She wrote a Hanukkah poem that was put to music and became a mainstay of Israeli folkdance and inspired an entire nation of individuals to band together and become a light to the world.

Banu choshech legaresh, beyadeinu or va'esh. Kol echad hu or katan, vekulanu or eitan. Surah choshech, hal'ah sh'chor! Surah mipnei ha'or!

We came to drive away the darkness, in our hands is light and fire. Everyone's a small light, and all of us [together] are a firm light. Fight darkness, begone blackness! Fight because of the light!

This is the message of Hanukkah. We must come together as individuals, communities, and nations to shine a light on the darkness that can overshadow this world. We must all engage in acts of *Tikun Olam*, repairing the world, so together we can bring peace, justice and healing to all, as the Prophet Isaiah says:

I the LORD, in My grace, have summoned you, And I have grasped you by the hand. I created you, and appointed you A covenant people, a light of nations. (Isaiah 42:6)

It is our obligation to become examples of light in this world. It is our goal to speak truth to power and become partners in the creation of a world that is built on *Chesed*. And even though we all may have different jobs in this world, there is one that everyone of us is responsible for.... #bethelight

Wishing all a *Chag Urim Sameach* – A Joyous (and meaningful) Festival of Lights and may the coming year bring us calmness, peace and a world that will overflow with Chesed.



I look forward to seeing everyone at one, two, or three of our planned, events, engagements, programs and/or worship!



My Temple Isaiah Story - By June Feldman

I come from the North End of Winnipeg, Manitoba, where people like Monty Hall and David Steinberg (comedian and TV producer working with the likes of Larry David), also grew up. I believe it was David Steinberg's grandpa, a Rabbi, who lived in our building. Funny thing is, he looked like Santa Claus!

This was a poorer area of Winnipeg. Almost entirely Ukrainian and Jewish. Both groups were close knit, but especially the Jews. I remember seeing what I believe was the Forward being read by my neighbors. (Or this was the Canadian equivalent). Because I am sure almost everyone was Orthodox, at that point.

Around 1895 and later, Canada was advertising for homesteaders to come to Canada, and there was an exodus of poor peasant farmers from Ukraine, of which both my sets of grandparents were a part. Some farmers went to Alberta, and some to Saskatchewan, and a lot to Manitoba. Jews also came, but there also had been Jews who had come earlier, and that had to do with the fur trade, and then manufacturing in Manitoba. But Manitoba was wheat growing country, a hard wheat, which, after harvest, was later sent to Italy for pasta. Durum wheat. And both sets of grandparents were farmers. Indeed, I am a farmer's daughter, BUT have never lived on a farm. We lived in the city, but our land was about as far from us, as New York City is from Great Neck! 17 miles.

I became a teacher, loved it, but also loved to fly, and travel, so became an airline stewardess. Never call someone who was a stewardess, a flight attendant! World of difference, which I will not go into at this time. While I didn't love every aspect of being a stewardess, I had much to appreciate, as well, primarily because I had many special assignments with United Airlines, which I also will not go into at this time! United Airlines was the biggest airline in the world then, and I was proud to be a part of it.

Allan got on the plane late one night, angry with United for being late. I felt that it was my place to mollify disgruntled passengers. I must have done a pretty good job, because he then offered me a job in what would be his office in Chicago, where he was moving to, from New York. I didn't like offices, and so I declined.

However, we ended up dating, and eventually marrying, living in Chicago. But, this was a monumental decision for me because I was raised Protestant, although Ukrainians are typically Ukrainian Orthodox (same as Greek Orthodox, really) or Ukrainian Catholic. My grandfather was a lay minister, and I grew up with a pretty solid background. Conversion was not an easy thing for me or was it easy on my family, either. In fact, some of them never really got over it.

We moved from Chicago when our kids were almost 4, and 2. Moved to our house that we still live in. When I felt that the kids should go to Hebrew school, I shopped around, like everyone else. But, I wasn't happy with most of the temples I saw.

Temple Isaiah was the guest congregation in the church on Stoner Ave. I liked the concept of two religions under one roof. It was a comfort for me. BUT, I also like the simplicity of what I saw in Temple Isaiah. I liked the people I met. Unfortunately, many of the people that Allan and I both looked up to have passed on, people we greatly admired, but still there are those here that we still enjoy. And, for me, to a great extent, I found a home in the temple. When I made my decision, to join, I felt a weight had been lifted.

As you must know, Temple Isaiah became a very important part of my life. I have learned a lot along the way. To some extent, it has replaced the family I lost in Canada.
