

As we enter the month of June and think of the upcoming sultry days of summer, our temple life begins to slow down as we prepare for the less formal summer lay-led services, but NOT this June. We have so much going on, that you'll need a scorecard to know what's coming up next.

Starting out this week, we have our regular Shabbat services on June 3rd at 6:30pm (both in person and online), followed up on Saturday morning with Torah study and then Saturday evening (June 4th) we will celebrate the holiday of Shavuot with a Tikun Leil Shavuot, a Shavuot study session, online via Zoom, beginning at 7:30pm. MEMBERSHIP DUES FAO

Q. How is the Sustaining Member Dues derived?

A. Each spring the Board of Trustees prepares a budget for the coming fiscal year (June 1st to May 31st and decides what portion of our budgeted cost should be met from dues with the balance coming from fundraising. The Board then sets the Sustaining Member Dues level. Both the Budget and the Sustaining Member Dues are voted on at the Annual Congregational Meeting in May.

Each year, members who have the means contribute more than Sustaining Member Dues through donations, fundraising and by pledging at the Mitzvah, Isaiah's Circle, or Torah levels. In this way they recognize their commitment to Judaism and Temple Isaiah. Through this structure, we seek to minimize fundraising activities and maximize the low and no-cost Temple activities that we value.

Q. What does "self-evaluation" and "gift from the heart" mean?

A. Self evaluation refers to the process by which a member determines how much they are financially capable of paying. In case they cannot pay full Sustaining Dues, we ask that they pay as close to the full amount as possible to reduce added financial burden on others. The self-evaluation process similarly leads some members to pay amounts above the Sustaining Member Dues. This has been true during the entire existence of Temple Isaiah.

Our parent organization, the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ), references the Torah portion T'rumah in which Moses receives detailed instructions from God about how to build and equip the Tabernacle, and that it should be constructed by the Israelites with "gifts from the heart." Hence, following self-evaluation, we both suggest amounts for dues, as well as refer to any other amount as a gift from the heart.

Q. What if I/We join in the middle of the fiscal year?

A. We trust your integrity to pledge as much as you can to contribute to the maintenance of Temple Isaiah. The more that we raise directly through your pledges and direct contributions, the less fundraising we need to do. Our budget is "no frills" – your money goes to essentials.

Q. What if my/our financial circumstances change?

A. We value your voluntary desire to affiliate with a synagogue. Our philosophy recognizes everyone's financial cycles. You pledge what you can afford. In good times we hope that you will pledge generously. In difficult times we welcome your commitment to affiliate as a Jewish act.

Q. What if I/we only want to come to the High Holidays or to say Yizkor on Yom Kippur?

A. We need the support of our members. Our synagogue functions 365 days a year and incurs expenses throughout the year. Even those who only occasionally use the Temple should understand its needs and help provide for them, just as good citizens of Great Neck accept the obligation to contribute to our community even though we may not take advantage of all its programs. As members of Temple Isaiah, we ensure the future of this congregation through adequate financial support, just as those before us preserved this congregation for us.

Q. What is the Building Maintenance Fund?

A. Every member of Temple Isaiah is asked to make a voluntary payment to the Building Maintenance Fund, with a minimum suggested pledge of \$1,800 payable over 5 years. The purpose of the Building Maintenance Fund is for maintenance and improvement of our home at One Chelsea Place. Members are asked to submit a Building Fund pledge (found on the Membership Dues Form) with their membership application, which details the amount of the building maintenance fund pledge and the proposed payment schedule. For historical perspective, 92 member families contributed on average about \$13,000 each to build Temple Isaiah. Members who previously contributed \$1,800 or more to the Temple Isaiah Building Fund or to building fund of another URJ Synagogue are exempt.

Our family belonged to Little Neck Jewish Center but when Forrest, our special needs child, wasn't well served, we considered other temples. We had experiences with Temple Emanuel and Temple Beth-El, and then attended Shabbat services at Temple Isaiah.

Our family histories were rooted in Orthodoxy, so we came into Temple Isaiah with the trepidation of entering a church. We were pleasantly surprised by Rabbi Tsuruoka, whose warmth, mentshlekheyt and humanity shone brightly, and the strength of community and caring we observed within the congregation.

The school principal was very reassuring about Forrest's special needs, and the people were friendly and warm, the services very enjoyable, and the history of the temple impressive and uplifting, with the financial aspect of "fair share" being a standout. We joined and have continued our journey for 20 years, sharing much joy and sorrow with fellow congregants.

Sadly, we have lost beloved family and friends from our temple family, but hope to gain more soon to reinvigorate temple life. One very special moment for Elliott was being the master of ceremonies for a public conversation at the Great Neck Library between Rabbi Theodore Tsuruoka and Rabbi Moshe Firrouz, Chief Karaite Rabbi of Israel, when he spent time with us several years ago. Their discussion involved the issues relating to their differences. This was the first time that a Reform rabbi engaged in a public dialogue with a leader of the Karaite movement.

More recently, I enthusiastically enjoyed sharing time at the Women's March in Manhattan with several Temple Isaiah activist women (you all know who you are!), attending a Holocaust Museum speech, two baby namings and enlightening, enriching Torah study with a small circle of temple friends. Many thanks to all of the committed, wonderful people who make attending services and events at Temple Isaiah something our family eagerly looks forward to on a consistent basis. We share the hope that Temple Isaiah will continue to serve this community for many decades to come.

Our story was written in May of 2017. The past 5 years have brought many changes and wonderful activities at Temple Isaiah for us, like preparing and serving several Tu B'Shvat and Passover Seders, and, of course, Shabbat services we have conducted at the Atria since 2005.

Our congregation is diminishing, but not our spirit! We look forward to many more years at Temple Isaiah.


