Rabbi's Column





Here we are again on the cusp of September, with Labor Day just a mere few days away. You can feel the tensions and the freneticism of the new school year, and this year, even as we enter the month before our High Holy Days, we can feel the tenseness, and the anxiety ridden environment of the spiritual and the secular world we live in. In our Jewish tradition, feeling this strange uneasiness is not unique. Each September, we in the Jewish community are faced with existential questions asked in the deepest recesses of our hearts when the Yamim Noraim - The Days of Awe are upon us. Where has the time gone? What will be in store for me, my family, my life.

Yet, this year, these feelings feel even more intense. Since October 7th, 2023, the Jewish world has become hyper focused on the State of Israel and the state of being Jewish in a not so simple world. Even our feelings about Israel are deeply nuanced and the answers we seek are not always easy to absorb. And then there are the issues that hit a lot closer to home. Between the political, and the personal environments, there are fears, discomfort and anxiety. It is so clear that this is NOT an easy time for anyone. This year more than ever (at least it feels like that for me), with so much going on in our world and in our lives, we easily lose focus of what is good, right under our nose. We allow our thoughts, our actions, and our emotions to be hijacked by the freneticism of the moment, and frankly, that is a very valid feeling. The loss of what we understand to be control of our lives, control of our

environment, and control of our bodies can be overpowering. It almost begs for an outlet, a means to cry out, to act, to verbalize our deepest feelings.

These deep feelings quickly erode our sense of personal safety and well-being, and we begin to lose sight of a most important concept in Judaism and especially this time of year, the concept of Hakarat HaTov meaning the recognition of good in our lives. Don't get me wrong, it totally makes sense that we feel emotionally untethered, and rightly so, yet, our Days of Awe, combined with an "attitude of gratitude" can bring a different path for us to follow, even if just for a few days, and hopefully we can hold onto it for much longer, and allow for hope and comfort to seep in.

A few weeks ago, we commemorated Tisha B'Av, the 9th of the Jewish month of Av which is considered the saddest day in the Jewish calendar, but the message that we are left with in the very last verse of the Book of Lamentations (Eicha) is one of hope, renewal and returning not the idea of sadness and lose. It teaches us:

HaShiveinu Adonai Eilekha venashuva Ḥaddeish yameinu kekedem - Bring us back, Eternal our God, to You, and let us come back Renew our days as before! (Lamentations 5:21)

What is even more interesting is that this verse from Lamentations is repeated often in our High Holy Day liturgy. The theme of return runs through every prayer service and becomes the concept behind T'shuvah - what many translate as repentance but means returning. We are asked to return so that we may find goodness, and blessing.

But how to return? This Shabbat we blessed the Hebrew month of Elul. (which begins this coming week) and it is a magical and profound month marked by the daily sounding of the Shofar. I have always found the shrill sounds of the shofar to act as a spiritual alarm clock telling us Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur are near and teaching us that the time to return is upon us.

Flul is a month of self-examination and returning to a godly path. It begins the season of holiness, and marks a time to re-boot ourselves. To cast away the old and perhaps toxic self-images we may be hiding, and to embrace self-healing. It is also a time for crying out, and a time of action for emotional (and this year national) healing.

Elul brings with it a feeling of M'chilah - forgiveness, love and understanding, Rachmanut - Compassion, for others and ourselves, and a sense of reconnecting with family and community. Elul is a month when we recommit ourselves to relationships both of Godly proportion, and to relationships between us and the people in our lives, and community.

For me, this Elul feels so much more important in almost every aspect of my life. There are so many things going on in our world (both Jewish and personal) that I need time to reflect on what is good in my life. I know for me, this reflection helps when the less than good times interfere with life. I also know there is hard work for me and all of us to do at this time of year. I know it may sound cryptic, but this Elul is not a time we can just sit and watch the world go by. We must take action to heal as much as possible.

As we enter this holy month, let us remember to cultivate a sense of gratitude and focus on the important things in life through self-examination and mindfulness and action. May we release negativity and breath in forgiveness and grace. May the "Great Shofar" awaken that inner "still small voice" so we may return to a space of wholeness, peace and love. Let us join together as we bring in this New Year with prayer and song, reconnecting with dear friends and family.

Wishing you a meaningful Elul. I look forward to praying with you in the temple as we usher in the New Year of 5785.






The Tax Man May Not Cometh
