Rabbi's Column





ounting (up) the days of the Omer (literally, an Israelite unit of dry measurement), we begin to feel the excitement rising as we get closer to Z'man Mattan Toratenu - the Time of the giving of our Torah, otherwise known as Shavuot, But Shavuot is a complex holy day according to the Jewish Bible and is known

by different names. Per the Torah text, it is not directly linked to an historical event such as Exodus or traveling in the Desert. There is no communal ritual attached to it, such as a seder or sitting in a Sukkah. There isn't even an exact date given for this holiday- again unlike Pesach and Sukkot. In Exodus 34:22, the holiday is in fact called Chaq HaShavuot, the festival of weeks, but a little earlier in Exodus (23:16), the holiday is called Chaq HaKatzir, or the Festival of the Harvest. To add to this confusion, in Numbers 28:26, the name becomes Chag HaBikurim, the Festival of the First Fruits. Then, to make it even more confounding, rabbis couldn't figure out when the holiday began, with different understandings of when one should begin counting the Omer. Yet, in my opinion, Shavuot, is the most important of the Shalosh Regalim our three harvest holidays (Sukkot, Pesach and Shavuot) - but it is the least observed outside of the traditional Jewish communities. Why might that be?

With everything that is written about this holy day, what catches my attention is the concept of giving. As I pointed out above, one of Shavuot's names is "Z'man Mattan Toratenu – the Time of the Giving of the Torah" and it is clear that the Torah was meant to be a gift to the Israelite nation. But can there be giving without receiving? If the day commemorates the giving of the Torah, but our hearts are not open to receiving the essence of the Torah, is the Torah really a gift? Did the Jewish people really get the Torah, if many ignore the lessons of that Torah?

Maimonides said that when the Torah was given to Israel, the people gathered around Har Sinai - Mount Sinai, some around the base of the mount and some higher up, so they were actually closer to the top. Maimonides' suggests that, although some were closer to the top, thus closer to the actual giving of the Torah, each and every member of Klal Yisrael - The Community of Israel

received the same Torah equally and we are all the recipients of the blessings and the spirit of the law. We are all invited to accept that gift.

When one gives a gift, it is generally given with good intention and caring, and many of us feel good when we can give to others. When we receive a gift from someone else, we feel appreciated, and hopefully, we return that appreciation with genuine feelings of gratitude. When we take the gift and show our appreciation, we give a gift to the giver in the form of gratitude. We are able to accept the gift and the feelings behind it, thus allowing the giver and receiver to feel closer. This holds true in gift giving, and in relationships as well. It is common to our relationships between family and friends, and our relationship with God and Torah.

In the same sense, the giving of the Torah was a gift to the Israelite nation, and it is our part of the relationship with God to take into our hearts the essence and spirit of the Law. Yes, it's true that many of the laws are difficult to understand, and to even consider participating in, but there is the ethical and moral side, the "spirit of the law," that forms a guide to living our lives and to show we are truly created in the divine image.

By accepting the ethical values in the Torah into our lives and hearts, we make room for a possible relationship with God. This works with Torah, and in our daily lives. The more room we make to accept gifts from others and show gratitude, the deeper and more emotionally nourishing all our relationships can be, divine and human.

Remember to join us all on June 1st for "a mountain of Blintzes" with our Festival Committee at our temple beginning at 5:15 pm and then our annual Tikkun Leil Shavuot at Temple Tikva of New Hyde Park, beginning at 6:45 pm. There will be teaching by our local Reform Rabbis and a copious amount of goodies afterwards. Registration is needed for Temple Tikva (see Events).

I wish you all the blessing of an open heart and the gift of close and loving relationships. Chag Shavuot Sameach - Happy Shavuot. May this season of freedom and revelation be one of sacred remembrance for us all. May the memories of our loved ones be as a blessing, and may we carry their light with us as we move forward together in community, with open hearts and loving souls.
