Rabbi's Column





asn't it just yesterday when we were getting ready for the summer vacation? Maybe a few days at the beach or in the country. And yet, each year when September rolls around I say to myself, where has the time gone? These past two months have flown by so quickly, and

it feels a little unnerving, to say the least.

Where has the time gone? I hear this all the time, especially when we are talking about our golden years. But this is also the existential question asked in the deepest recesses of our hearts during the Yamim *Noraim - The Days of Awe.* Where has the time gone?

Sheryl Sandberg, at the end of shloshim (the traditional 30-day mourning period) for her late husband, said that her friend, who is a rabbi, shared a short prayer that said, "please don't let me die while I am still alive." This is quite a shocking prayer (and personal statement), and I must tell you: it stopped me in my tracks. It forced me to ask myself, what can I learn about myself, my own resilience, and how can I communicate this to others around me? What is this experience of being alive?

The centerpiece of our High Holy Day service is the piyyut (Liturgical poem), "Unetane Tokef" – "Let us speak of the great power of the day". This poem voices the most central question of the High Holy Days, "what will this New Year bring to me"? There are many themes in this 4-part poem, but one that resonates with me is, U'vashofar gadol Yitaka, v'kol d'mamah dakah yishamah - The great shofar will be sounded, and the still small voice will be heard. I understand this to mean, the sound of the "Great Shofar" will spiritually awaken us, and we will hear our own minds more clearly. It will open our hearts and minds and allow us to reflect honestly, and thoughtfully on the past year. It is not to trigger quilt, nor is it to there to scare us, but rather to allow ourselves the room to grow both emotionally and

spiritually. Perhaps to see our lives differently and to celebrate the blessings we have, and maybe we can be role models showing others how to live positively and be grateful for the time we have on this earth.

Just days ago, we began the Hebrew month of Elul, and it is a magical and profound month marked by the daily sounding of the Shofar. Those shrill sounds act as a spiritual alarm clock awakening us to the dawning of Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur.

Elul is a month of self-examination and returning to a godly path. It begins the season of holiness and marks a time of renewal, encouraging us to cast away the old, perhaps toxic, self-images we may be hiding, and to embrace self-healing. Elul is also the month of S'lichot-Penitential Prayers for Forgiveness. It is a time when we ask for forgiveness from God and our loved ones, but it is also a time when we forgive, and just as we forgive our loved ones, so should we have "Rachmanut"compassion for ourselves. Elul is a month when we recommit ourselves to relationships with the Divine, and with those who are most important in our lives.

Many who practice yoga set an intention, or focus for their practice, and ultimately for their day-to-day lives. In Jewish tradition, our intention is called Kayannah also a focus or intention. *Kayannah* acts as a foundation of mindful awareness for our journey through this month of holiness. With kavannah, we begin to pay attention to "the important things in our lives", and we gain an understanding of the need for gratitude in our daily lives.

As we enter this sacred month of Elul, let us remember to cultivate a sense of gratitude and focus on the important things in life, because time is passing. May we release negativity and breathe in forgiveness, and may the "Great Shofar" awaken that inner "still small voice" so we may return to a space of wholeness, peace and love, and strive not to die while we are still alive.

I wish you and those you love, a Shanah Tovah U'metukah – A good and sweet year, and I look forward to seeing you in the temple as we usher in 5786.

Co-President's Column





emple Isaiah was founded in 1967 in the aftermath of the Six Day War between Israel and Syria, Jordan, and Egypt, with the support of Saudi Arabia and other Arab neighbors.

The founders, who had lived through World War II and the Holocaust just 20 years earlier, were reminded that the Jewish people needed a home where they would be accepted and safe. So they celebrated the end of the war and the promise of the State of Israel. Temple Isaiah was always dedicated to progressive Judaism based on the code of ethics found in the Torah that insists, among other things, on the sanctity of life, the rejection of murder, and the demand not to bear false witness. The founders likely never foresaw the situation which now faces progressive Jews who

still believe that the Jewish people, like all others, deserve a state in their historic homeland.

Rabbi Josh Weinberg, the head of ARZA (the Zionist arm of the reform movement) asks: "...how do we remain faithful to this covenant when reality on the ground could feel like a betrayal of its core values? How do we approach the increasingly difficult conundrum of affirming Israel's right to exist, for Jews to be a free people in our Land, and separate the Zionist project and significance of a modern Jewish State from the current Israeli government that expresses little interest in ending the war, returning the hostages, and time and again acquiesces to the Haredi and ultra-nationalist parties all the while confronting the images of starvation, flattened homes in Gaza, and the rising death tolls among the innocent civilians?"

I believe, as does Rabbi Weinberg, that the answer isn't to abandon Zionism but to return it to its moral roots.


