#### Rabbi's Column





ast week we began the Hebrew month of Cheshvan. The Sages of the Mishnah and Talmud called it MarCheshvan or the "Bitter Month of Cheshvan," perhaps because there are no holidays, but I see it through an entirely different lens. Mar. in

Hebrew, means 'bitter,' but it can also mean 'a drop of rain.' I see it as the time of planting new seeds and allowing the winter rains/snows to cultivate and spread their bounty as the seasons turn from Winter to Spring (yes, I am looking forward) and we begin to reap the fruits of our work. In our T'filah, we add the Hebrew words. Mashiv haRuach u Morid and haGashem - "You cause the wind to shift and the rain to fall." This is the time of year not only of changes to the weather but also changes to our status quo. These rains nourish not only our earth, but also our souls, allowing us to look towards the future with open eyes and open hearts.

This month we also read Parashat Lech L'cha (the November 1st Shabbat) which tells the origin story of Avram (before he was called Abraham) being commanded by God to leave his land, his birthplace, and his father's home to a land that God will show him. Cheshvan is a month of moving forward. New beginnings, new adventures, and new things to be learned..

During Cheshvan, we have begun our season of seed planting by reaching out to our friends at Temple Tikvah of New Hyde Park. Rabbi Scheinberg and I have been working for quite a while on ways for both congregations to pray, learn and play together. This is a wonderful way of building bridges with other Reform congregations, and I am excited to see what can become of these discussions.

Our temple is at a turning point, and only we can turn it around by showing up, and helping and reaching out to the greater Reform community. Shelley, Terry and Kathie have been hard at work, putting together our bazaar and so many other activities and events in store for us, but we need your participation and understanding that we are on the cusp of change.

Avram took a giant leap of faith and as a congregation we must take that same leap of faith. We cannot sit around thinking that things get done by themselves. We need each of you to join hands in helping our little temple to stay relevant, and to stay alive. We can do it; we just have to work a teeny bit harder and participate.

When we shift our perspective we see that Cheshvan is not bitter, but rather is a month full of potential, activity and a sense of moving forward. I hope and pray that this Cheshvan is a productive and meaningful month for you and those you love. That when it rains, let us not just see clouds and gloom overhead, but the potential of new projects we are beginning together as a community, and that together with new friends, we continue to learn, support and build on the foundation that makes up the community we love and care for so much.

As this bulletin reaches you, election day will be upon us. Voting seems to be a right we still have, so I encourage everyone to exercise that right.

Speaking of elections, as we all know, the likely new mayor of NY says he is not a Zionist. He doesn't believe that Israel should be a "Jewish State," although he recognizes its right to exist. He says he feels that way about all nations which have a state religion (I doubt he counts Britain, whose King is also head of the Church of England, but I digress). I don't want to focus on him or his individual beliefs, but rather on the concept of whether there is a difference between Israel as the home of the Jewish people, or the

home of people who happen to be Jewish by religion.

In other words, is Israel a Jewish state because it was reestablished by the United Nations to once again be the homeland for its earlier inhabitants who had been in exile for millennia-with the additional welcome to those who have joined the people thereafter?

This is a trick question, because every Jew has the Right of Return (assuming they meet the standards of the Ministry of Immigration). The nomenclature itself illustrates the issue: Israel ensures the right to RETURN from exile. Does this make it a Jewish State, and is there anything objectionable about this, at this point?

Calling all Temple Members:

Starting November 1 we will be sending monthly statements by email, to assist in paying minor charges (i.e. events) and to keep up with your dues payments. If you have questions about past due balances, please contact me (email is best: williamhhersh@gmail.com, and please note the h in the middle). You can pay by Zelle (you'll need to call the office for details the first time you use this) or send us a check! Thank you, those of you who have already squared your accounts.

The new fiscal year started June 1. By now you may have lost those pledge forms, so if you did not pledge or did not pay your pledge in full, please email the office and let us know your choices..

Last but not least, if you are making RMDs (Required Minimum Distribution) from an IRA or an inherited IRA, you can contact your brokerage and have them send us a check as a QCD (Qualified Charitable Donation), and it is not taxable but still counts towards your RMD. It has to go directly from the broker to the Temple. Use it for your dues, recent items that perhaps were not already sent in (like your Kol Nidre Appeal contribution and the Volunteers Luncheon Oct. 19) - maybe share the tax savings with us and give more! Remember that brokerages get a lot of these requests in December so don't wait until the last minute.





