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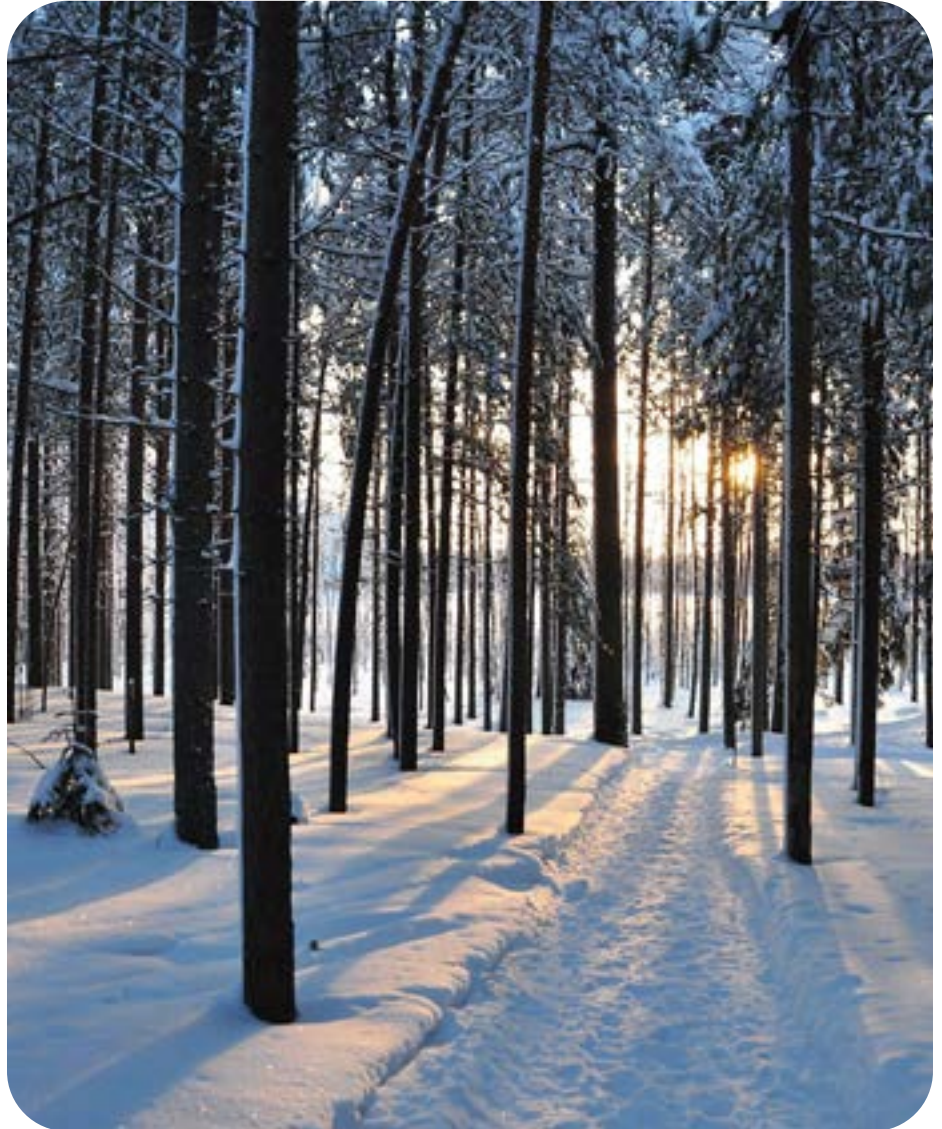

**D**ear friends, we are again on the cusp of a new year and, as I have often said in years gone by, where has the time gone? Why does it feel like each new year comes upon us so much faster? I can barely keep track of all the changes in our lives, our political environment, and for our

worldwide Jewish community. This world does not feel like it's on stable footing and, with antisemitism on the rise, our personal sense of security feels at risk.

On Shabbat Hanukkah, I spoke about how the lights of the Hanukkah Menorah are very different from our Shabbat candles. The Shabbat candles are there to shed light so we can see, eat, read and have the warmth of the Shabbat throughout our homes. The lights on the Hannukiyah serve a different purpose. It is more about *Pirsum HaNeis*, about making famous the Miracle story of Hanukkah and shining light where the world has become darkened. The question was asked: how do we do that? I answered that the word Hanukkah is closely related to Hebrew word *Chinuch*, meaning education, meaning that we must show up and confront the challenges to our nation, people and Jewish community. It is our job to teach and retell the story of our people so we can all learn from history.

Our future depends on how we can work with our community and others to move forward. There are ways I believe we can do this, but it depends greatly on how we show up. We must have clear goals and a workable plan that will help us grow both spiritually and as a community of liberal-minded Jews in our area.

In our Torah study, we often come across a word that is meaningful both spiritually and practically. That word is *Hineni*, and it means I am here, yet a truer and more nuanced understanding of the word is, "I am present" and I am prepared to do what is needed at any given moment. It is a word that describes the state of mind of one who is ready to take on a task of great importance.

So important is the word *hineni*, that it is used over 17 times in the Jewish Bible in this form, and hundreds of times in other grammatical formations. Our Biblical leaders, like Avraham and Moshe, were often in that state of readiness, but I wonder what this would mean for us as moderns. We are not often called upon to lead our people out of slavery, nor asked to perform acts of prophecy, so how might it apply to our lives and our temple community?

Being in a state of "Hineni" can describe a state of spiritual openness during our services, or being present for someone in our community who is in need of companionship, or just a quick hello on the phone. It could also mean that one would be on call to help with our activities and events during the year. It's clear that I believe the most important way we can be in a "Hineni" state of mind is to become an active participant in our temple family. Come join a committee or show up for our learning sessions. You don't have to take on a leading role, but everyone can help make our temple successful. We need you to become our ambassadors to the outside world. Bring friends to our services or events, and of course, bring yourselves. This coming year, it is also important to join together with the other Reform congregations in the area for activities and events. We are looking forward to combining with Temple Tikvah on study sessions and some social events too, and as you can see from our calendar, we have a lot to participate in this coming Spring.

As we enter 2026 let us be grateful for all that was good during these past years, and to know how we have grown from the challenges of this past year as well. We pray that this new year will inspire us to be present and participate in the growth of our community. When we are called upon to help our temple family, may we always say "Hineni: I am here and ready" to be part of the way forward for our Kehillah Kedoshah, our holy community.

Wishing you and those you love, a very Happy New Year. May 2026 be a year of health, blessing, coming together in unity and peace.

### Let's Talk and Listen!

Some years ago, a member of our community launched a discussion group called The Ambivalence Group. It began as a welcoming space to explore questions about Jewish beliefs and practices, and soon broadened to include deeper life and existential topics. The group met monthly, with participants joining whenever they could and bringing whatever was on their minds.

We are now considering reviving a similar group—this time meeting virtually—so that transportation and scheduling are no longer obstacles. The proposal is for a one-hour, once-a-month online gathering, hosted by an alternating group member. Each session would begin with a brief five-minute update from the host, followed by a short ten-minute introduction to a chosen topic by another participant. An open and organic discussion would then follow.

When exploring what topics tend to interest aging congregations in virtual settings, we found that conversations often include topics of local, national or international interest, personal and societal, etc.:

In many communities, virtual gatherings have become a meaningful way to strengthen personal connections. Often, it is these social bonds themselves that form the heart of the experience.

If you are interested in participating—or if you have ideas for topics or how the group should run—we would love to hear from you. If we do not receive responses, we will assume there is not sufficient interest and will set the idea aside for now.

Calling all Temple Members:

OK, so maybe you missed that last chance for a charitable donation for 2025, but it's 2026 and never too early to give to Temple Isaiah. You can pay by Zelle (you'll need to call the office for details the first time you use this) or send us a check!

Once again, if you are making RMDs (Required Minimum Distribution) from an IRA or an inherited IRA, you can contact your brokerage and have them send us a check

as a QCD (Qualified Charitable Donation), and it is not taxable but still counts towards your RMD. It has to go directly from the broker to the Temple. Use it for your dues or recent items that perhaps were not already sent in, or even future items like the auction or gala dinner.

### Social Action Committee

As we begin a new year and say good riddance to an extremely difficult 2025, we must all look for small ways to make a positive difference. To that end, volunteering seems like the way to go. In addition, of course, to Temple Isaiah, there are many other organizations that can use help.

If you are interested in making sure people have enough to eat, you can volunteer at a local food bank or food collection and distribution organization such as Island Harvest, The Inn, Food Rescue US, or Nosh Delivers. Additionally, our synagogue will be collecting food on an on-going basis, which will be distributed to Hatzilu or another similar organization.

If your interest lies with protecting immigrants, consider participating with groups who accompany those appearing in Immigration Court, or those groups who help alert others to the presence of ICE in their areas. Check out opportunities with the New York Immigration Committee and Make the Road New York. Also, consider boycotting retailers that cooperate with or fund ICE: Home Depot, Dell, BP, AT&T, Deloitte, Motorola, Spotify, Thomson/Reuters and ARCO. These days, there may be no greater power than to protest with your pocketbook.
